## The Creamery Ready For Business

The creamery plant that has been under construction for some time has been completed and turned over to the stockholders by L. B. Zeimer, a representative of the firm of Monroe & Shelton of Portland. The plant is modern in every way. The machinery consists of a large cooling tank, or ripener, a five hundred gallon churn and other appliances used in the production of butter. With this plant one man can turn out 1200 pounds of butter per day. A 2½ horse-power engine will furnish the motive power. Butter-making will begin this fall.
