Shooting Scrape At Shaniko

Shaniko was the scene of a shooting scrape at midnight Sunday wherein a sheepherder named McConnelly lost his life.

Thomas Hale, a well known gambler, came into the Columbia Southern hotel bar at Shaniko somewhat intoxicated, flourishing a revolver and using threatening language. The bartender became alarmed and went out to call the marshal, leaving only Hale and a sheepherder, Tom McConnelly, in the saloon.

Two men passing the saloon heard Hale tell McConnelly that he had nothing against him and would not hurt him. Soon after they heard three shots fired and entering the saloon found McConnelly dead, shot three times.

An inquest was held Monday morning and Hale was held for the crime. He was taken to the Dalles for safe keeping.

Hale is considered a desperate character. McConnelly had been working some time for the Baldwin Sheep & Land company. He bore a good reputation for being orderly and for attending to his own business.

Redmond Items.

Redmond, Aug. 26.

A load of fruit from the Cove orchard passed through here Friday evening. Mr. Boegli is sending out some very fine apples, plums and peaches now.

The pump at the town well was started to running Saturday but it was found necessary to take out the rods and that went over until today.

Geo. McQueen says it took 24 pounds of twine to the acre to bind his oats, and that stands for a pretty good yield of grain hay.

Preparations for a bigger, better and busier fair than ever are going forward. We will have with us Prof. F. L. Kent of the Oregon Agricultural College who will judge the stock and give an address on the evening of the 20th.

Dr. Withycomb, director of the Experiment station writes that delivering an address at the State Fair on the same date prevents him being with us, but he hopes to come next year with a stereopticon and give an illustrated lecture showing agricultural progress in Oregon.

Class superintendents will be as follows: Frank McCaffery for horses, cattle, swine and sheep; E. C. Park for poultry; Asa Benton with Walter Gillespie as assistant for farm machinery, and Hugh O'Kane for speed and sports.

If owners of stock are unable to be present the association will have it cared for at his expense, and there will be no charge for stalls and pens.

Farm products are to be of the crop of 1917. Competitive entries will be by number as last year and exhibitors name will not be used until after awards are made.

There will be a base ball tournament on the 20th and 21st, open to Crook county. Applications for entry should be made to the secretary R. C. Immelee by Sept. 12. E. C. Park.
