

SCHOOL OPENED
MONDAY

The public schools of Prineville opened Monday with an increase of attendance all along the line. In the high school department the number of students from outside districts is greater than ever before, and many more are expected just as soon as the fall work is done. The high school staff is as follows: M. B. Hockenberry principal, teacher of science and English; Catherine Conway, teacher of Latin and classics; Cordelia Stevens, teacher of mathematics, science and German; Ethel Bradford, teacher of history and English.

Grazing Regulations Upheld

The fourth important case won by the government upon the question whether it is a crime to violate the regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture has just been decided in the United States District court, held at Deadwood, South Dakota, where Robert B. Bale was found guilty of grazing trespass on the Black Hills National forest and fined \$100 and costs. Mr. Bale at once paid the fine and was released.

The defendant is a stock owner residing south of Rapid City and has been grazing about 150 head of cattle in and adjacent to the Black Hills National Forest for some years. When the range in the National forests was put under administration in 1906 and the grazing fee system introduced, Mr. Bale refused to secure a grazing permit or to remove his stock from the forest.

After repeated efforts on the part of the local forest officers to persuade Mr. Bale to remove the stock, he was finally arrested and August, 1906, was indicted by the United States grand jury at Deadwood. The trial of the case was delayed over two terms of court by an effort to have the case tried at Deadwood instead of Sioux Falls and the case was not presented to the jury until September 4. The court was prompt in overruling the defendant's demurrer attacking the constitutionality of the grazing regulations and in reaching a decision the jury was only out fifteen minutes.

The Airedale Terrier
The Airedale Terrier Standard calls for a dog of 40 to 45 pounds, a bitch slightly less weight. This is the heaviest of any of the terrier breeds. Head must be long with flat skull narrowing slightly to the eyes and free from wrinkle. Deep and powerful jaw with no choppiness. Lips tight against the teeth which meet squarely. Black nose. Ears V-shaped, flat against side of the head and small in size. Eyes small, dark and full of expression. Neck strong and free from throatiness. Coat hard and wiry, making a dense covering to the body. Tan color head, ears and legs; black or grizzley colored back. Dogs undershot or undershot jaws are disqualified, or those with overshot or undershot jaws are disqualified. Character shows strongly in this breed. The Airedale has a rough and ready, dare devil appearance. Of abundant energy and keenness, yet he shows no restlessness but carries himself with a self-poise and perfect restraint that is a source of pride and pleasure to his owner. Never seeking a fight, yet he is always ready to defend his rights and those of his master and is quick to resent an insult. The Airedale in point of intelligence is surpassed by no other breed of dogs. His strong qualities are those best suited for:
(1) Watch dog and companion; (2) Water dog and retriever; (3) Hunter of big game; (4) Messenger dog; (5) All round hunting dog.
He possesses a remarkably hardy constitution and adapts himself to his surroundings. On a long trip with pack outfit in the mountains the writer's two Airedales "Funch" and "Judy" foraged off the country catching and eating rabbits and woodchucks, being in splendid physical condition at the end of the trip while a setter that was along would have starved had he not been fed from the food supply of the party.
The Airedale is a dog that seldom barks unless with good and sufficient cause. He is absolutely free from the "yapping" that makes so many breeds of terriers a nuisance.
The Airedale terrier has been a distinct breed in England for over a century. He has been known also as the Waterside Terrier but owing to the fact that his native heath is in the Aire Valley in Yorkshire, by common consent he is now called the Airedale. The breed was little known in America until 1878 but since that date its popularity here has made rapid strides until today the breed is in big demand by all classes, especially apartment.
