Bend Mercantile Company Closed

An injunction has been served on Bend Mercantile Company by Sheriff Elkins. It was done at the instigation of the Central Oregon Banking & Trust Company. Two reasons are given by the bank for asking for an injunction: First, that the creditors are not receiving as much by running the business under the present plan as by selling the stock as a whole, and second, that the company's cut prices are seriously damaging all other business in town. The bank asks that a receiver be appointed to close up affairs. R. L. Sabin, of Portland, has been representing the company's creditors as trustee, and O. S. Crocker has been the local manager.
