

WATER FOR 12,000 ACRES

A force of 35 men and 18 teams is now camped at the old river bed in the vicinity of the location where the big stave pipe is to be built, the big flume that is to carry water across the old river bed onto the fertile lands surrounding Powell Buttes says the Bulletin. This crew has excavated a cut two and a half feet deep in which will be built the stave pipe. After the work is finished the pipe will be covered with dirt to protect it from the sun's heat. The pipe is 56 inches, or nearly six feet, in diameter. It was necessary to build 400 feet of flume at its entrance in order to keep the canal at the proper elevation.

This big stave pipe is an interesting piece of work. Few people have any idea of the amount of material in the way of staves, hoops and iron work that will be used in its construction. The weight of all this material aggregates 85 tons of freight, or 170,000 pounds. The entire shipment includes two car loads of lumber, one of iron rods, bands, etc., and a lot of local freight. About half of this material is on the ground now and the balance will be there in a week or ten days. The last car arrived in Shaniko last Tuesday.

Its cost would appear like quite a little fortune to some people. The contract price of the big pipe is \$6,600; it will cost \$1,800 to get it freighted from Shaniko, and the additional expense for lumber and labor will easily bring the total cost up to \$9,000 or \$10,000. The first expense will be heavy but it will be a lasting piece of work. Superintendent Redfield stating that similar pipes had lasted 20 years in other localities.

STOCK LOST FROM POISONING

That the poisonous plant investigative work now being carried on by the forest service in the different national forests throughout the west has awakened widespread interest is strongly illustrated by the increasing number of applications for new range examinations from users of the national forests.

Although this branch of the forest service work is still in its inception, it being a comparatively short time since the plan was initiated, good progress has already been made. A thorough examination of the Manti national forest in Utah, and partial examinations of the Huachuca in Arizona, Black Hills in South Dakota, and the Holy Cross in Colorado have been made and much very valuable information in regard to the plants most dangerous to stock has been secured. It is the intention of the forester to continue the work throughout the coming season and it will undoubtedly result in a series of important discoveries that will lead to the reduction of the loss of range stock from poisonous plants to a minimum.

In an application for an examination of poison areas in the Park Range and Sierra Madre forests in Colorado and Wyoming it is reported that the value of the sheep lost during the present season within a comparatively small area from poisonous plants is not less than \$15,000, there being 738 head of sheep lost out of one band, 450 out of another, and a number of smaller losses from other herds. Heavy losses of cattle have been reported from Colorado also.

While the work of investigation has been confined to the national forests the results obtained will be equally beneficial and applicable to the users of unreserved public lands as the poisonous plants are different species of two or three generic families and the discovery of an antidote, or a means of eradicating or checking the growth of one species will apply equally well to the others.

MEETING OF WOOLGROWERS

At the annual meeting of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association to be held in The Dalles November 12, one of the most vital subjects for consideration will be the government's proposition to lease the public ranges.

At the next session of congress the Burkett bill, introduced last session, but which was not reached on the calendar, will again be brought forth.

While the Burkett measure was under consideration last winter a committee of western stockmen was named by the president to meet with the public lands committee of congress and a session was held in Washington. Dan P. Smythe of Pendleton, was Oregon's committeeman at the time and while at the capital became familiar with the government's attitude toward the public range, says the East Oregonian.

"The proposition will be brought up again," says Mr. Smythe, "for the eastern people have the belief that western stockmen are being given something for nothing by the government and there is a wide demand that charges be made for using the range. It seems impossible for the western senators to block the measure, and if so, it is up to the stockmen to see that the measure passed is as well adapted to the conditions as possible."

"At the Dalles meeting, which will be the official gathering of the Oregon sheepmen this year, the subject will be discussed and some line of action probably agreed upon so that the Oregon congressional delegation can have some-
