Rev. J. A. Mitchell passed through the city Tuesday enroute to Bend from Portland where he has been for the past two weeks.

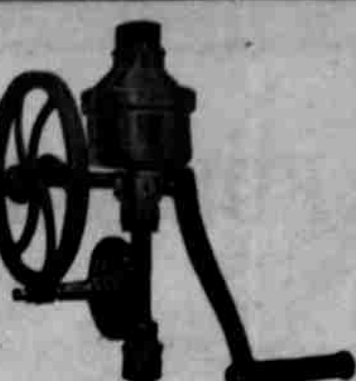

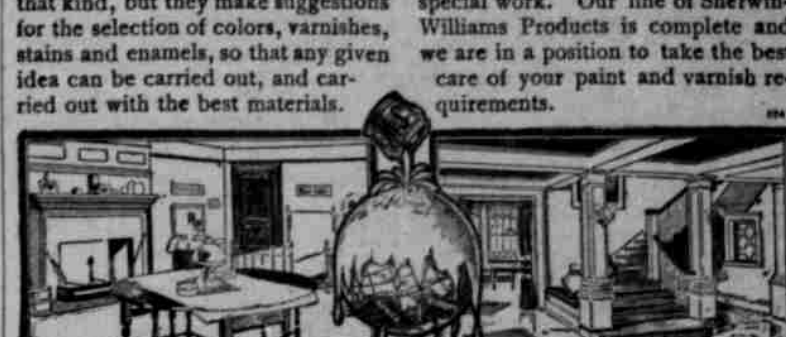
