In recent years, certain speculators and promoters have gained control of banks in New York in order that they might use depositors' money to bolster up their speculative projects, such as the making of Ice Trusts and the consolidation of steamship companies. It was their practice to use the stock and securities of one bank as a basis for loans with which they bought control of another, and so on, until 'a "chain" was completed. Thus, under lax official supervision, there were great opportunities for them to finance their schemes with other people's money. 
