We publish elsewhere in another column the financial statement of the First National Bank of Prineville. The report was made at the close of business on December 3. It shows that the bank is in a most flourishing condition. The loans and discounts are \$237,294.17; deposits, \$397,885.78. Special attention is called to the available cash reserve, due from banks and cash on hand. It amounts to \$172,345.19. This is 55 per cent of the deposits and 40 per cent in excess of the legal requirements. The report is certainly most gratifying to the general public, coming, as it does, just at this time. Both of our financial institutions are as solid as a rock and the governor's holidays have cut no figure in their methods of doing business.

Lose Fine Animal

The fine thoroughbred Belgian stallion, Brilliant D'Aubremee, owned by the Haystack Livestock Breeder's Association, died last week of pneumonia and in his death one of the best bred animals in the state has been lost to Crook County. Brilliant D'Aubremee won the blue ribbon in his class at the county fair at Prineville this year. He was a large black stallion, with glossy coat, and one of the showiest horses ever seen in the county. The Haystack Livestock Breeder's Association, which is composed of a number of farmers and stockmen residing in the Culver and Haystack neighborhoods, have suffered a heavy loss in the death of their big Belgian. The horse was valued at about \$3500.

G. Springer accompanied Henry Windom to the Willamette Valley this week, for the purpose of assisting him in selecting a new horse to replace the fine thoroughbred, Brilliant D'Aubremee, recently lost by the Haystack Livestock Breeder's Association, of which they were members. They expect if possible to buy another thoroughbred Belgian stallion to replace the one which died, although they anticipate some trouble in securing as fine an animal as the one they lost.—Pioneer.

Legal Holidays End Saturday

Gov. Chamberlain will discontinue the bank holidays after Saturday, the 14th. He says "Conditions are improving all over the state, and I cannot see any reason for interfering longer than that with the business of the courts, and the contractual relations of the citizens. I have great confidence in the patriotism of the people, and now that conditions are

understood by them, I am sure the creditor will be lenient with the debtor until confidence is restored and the financial stringency entirely relieved by further shipments of money from the east. I will discontinue these holidays after the 14th inst., and will only return to them in case it becomes absolutely necessary as a means of protecting the business interests and credit of the state.

Republican National Convention.

Chicago won the republican national convention on first ballot for the location of the republican national convention of 1908. The date on which the convention will meet is June 16.

Chicago holds clear title to the name of "Convention City," for of the eight men elected directly to the presidency since 1870 six were nominated in this city. Within that period of nearly half a century 10 National gatherings have been held here by the Republican and Democratic parties—nearly one-half of the great quadrennial assemblages had during that time. Of the eight men elected directly to the White House to fill the 12 Presidential terms since 1860, Lincoln, Grant, Garfield, Cleveland, Harrison and Roosevelt were named in Chicago. The two that did not come from a convention here were Hayes and McKinley. For their second terms, Lincoln and Grant were nominated in other cities, but Cleveland came from a Chicago convention both times that he was elected.
