

THE ANNUAL CITY ELECTION

The city election was held Monday. There was no particular interest shown in the matter until Monday morning. Then three tickets were put into the field. There was a "Citizens' Ticket," headed by Will Wurzweller for mayor, Walter O'Neil, D. P. Adamson and G. N. Clifton for councilmen, William Draper for recorder, J. L. McCulloch for treasurer, and J. H. Crooks for marshal. There was another ticket called the "Taxpayers' Ticket" with W. F. King for mayor; councilmen, J. W. Boone, W. A. Booth and J. H. Henderson. For recorder, M. H. Bell; treasurer, J. L. McCulloch, marshal, John Breeding. The third ticket was named the "People's Ticket." The only difference between it and the Citizens' ticket was for the offices of city recorder and marshal. William Wigle was out for recorder and P. B. Doak for marshal. The result of the ballots showed that the Citizens' ticket was elected. J. L. McCulloch was on all three tickets for treasurer. There were a few scattering votes. One hundred and sixty-seven ballots were cast. The following is the official count:
