Crook county has been subjected to a good thorough drenching since last Friday. The rain has not been torrential in character but of such a nature that most of it has soaked into the ground.

The rainfall for last Saturday has beaten all previous records. According to the government reports kept by Mr. Winnek 1.34 inches fell upon that day. Since last Friday we have had between three and four inches of moisture. This is about one-fourth of our regular annual supply.

The soil is now thoroughly soaked and rivers and creeks are beginning to show the effects of the storm. The Ochooco now carries quite a large volume of water and if the rain continues much longer its banks will be full. Cattlemen say that this rainstorm practically insures good feed on the range next year.
