LAKE IS ENTITLED TO THE OFFICE

Lake county is in a representative district composed of Lake, Klamath, Crook and Grant counties, which is entitled to two joint representatives, and also in a senatorial district composed of Crook, Klamath and Lake counties entitled to one senator says the Lake County Examiner. The interests of these counties are diversified, Crook and Grant counties are far to the north and difficult of adequate representation by men from the southern part of the district, likewise, Lake county is far to the south, and cannot possibly be represented by a man from any other part of the district. A proper distribution of the representatives in the legislature in this district would give all representation. Lake has been without representation in the legislature, and the time has come when we need representation there. We have as good timber as there is in the state, and there is no reason why we should not send a man to the legislature; surely other parts of the district could not find objection. Let us get together on some good man and all work for his election. While there are many who could represent us, we will suggest the name of Mr. H. A. Brattain, of Paisley. Mr. Brattain is one of the county's substantial business men, and having lived here many years is in touch with every question effecting this section of country. We feel positive that Mr. Brattain is a man in whom the interests of this district can be safely placed. That he is qualified for this important position, there is no doubt.

Right you are Examiner, and all Lake county has to do is to get together and nominate a man. Grant has had the senatorship for two terms, so has Crook county, and in all fairness the office is up to Lake or Klamath. If Lake prefers a representative then Klamath should have the senator. Representative Belknap is being urged by friends to make the run for a second term and it is possible he may do so. Just at present candidates are a little slow in making announcements.

WILL RACE FOR \$2000

Ever since the Prineville race meet last fall there has been a controversy as to the relative merits of "Brandy," a racehorse owned by Meyer & Brown of Paulina, and "Patsy Brown," a fleet-footed one owned by T. F. Buchanan, proprietor of the Hamilton Stables. Backers of both horses have got together and a race for a purse of \$2000 is the result. The date is set for May 5. One thousand dollars has been posted with Granville Clifton, of the firm of Clifton & Cornett, and the balance of the purse must be put up on or before the day of the race. The horses are to run a quarter of a mile. Hugh Lister is backing "Brandy," and Messrs. Buchanan, Bedell and A. M. Zevely will put up the coin on "Patsy Brown."

It has been suggested that a spring race meet be held at the same time, as horses from Klamath and Grants Pass would come here at that time.
