

Dr. Belknap for Representative.

In speaking of the progress of his campaign to succeed himself for a second term in the lower house, Dr. Belknap was most sanguine. Many flattering assurances of support come from his constituents all over the district. His nominating petitions have been circulated freely and have been liberally signed. They were filed with the secretary of State last week.

Dr. Belknap attended the University of Michigan two years and has been a member of the alumni of the University of New York since his graduation from the medical department of that institution in 1886.

He has lived in Crook county since boyhood and his wide professional acquaintance and many supporters in times past will no doubt be in evidence at the April primaries. He is an able citizen and an efficient legislator.
