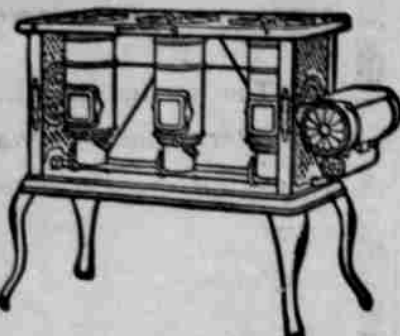


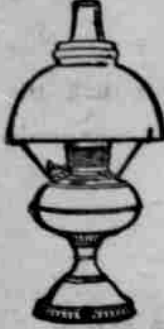

Rev. Father Hickey's Accident

Rev. Father Hickey who passed through Prineville the fore part of this week for his friends, Messrs. Morrow & Keenan's, is a very sick man and in a dangerous condition, as the result of a terrible accident he met with in the town of Redmond, a week or ten days ago.

The reverend gentleman had been making a thorough visitation of the Crook county portion of his parish, taking in Post, Paulina, Bend and Redmond, where the serious accident which nearly cost him his life occurred. In the dusk of the evening to the great horror of Mr. Redmond and family and friends, Father Hickey fell head foremost through an open trap door into the cellar of Mr. Redmond's house, where he was stopping, receiving severe and painful bruises, especially in the right arm, shoulder and breast, mashing the second finger of his left hand. It was a terrible shock to the reverend gentleman, and those who know of the locality of the accident say that it was a miracle that Father Hickey was not killed by the fall. The reverend father is making his way home to Wasco, Sherman county, by slow and easy stages and it will be some time we fear, before he is able to resume his professional duties with his wonted activity. Dr. Coe of Bend in response to a telephone call made a hard drive to reach Father Hickey at Redmond where he remained all night, and Drs. Belknap and Edwards of Prineville attended him during his stay in that town. The people of Crook county, who highly esteem Father Hickey will eagerly watch for his recovery and be very glad to welcome him again to their midst.
