**Took Booze to Redmond**

Two arrests were made Monday for the illegal use of liquor on election day. The offense took place at Redmond and when the Law and Order League heard of it immediately took steps to prosecute. A complaint was sworn to before Justice Jones by John Tuck of Redmond. Warrants were issued at once for the arrest of B. Puett of Prineville and Z. T. McClay of Redmond. These men had a hearing before Justice Jones on Tuesday. Puett plead guilty and was fined \$50. McClay entered a plea of not guilty. Upon investigation of the case by Judge Bell and Sheriff Elkins further evidence was found and each of the defendants was bound over to appear before the fall term of the circuit court. Bail was fixed at \$200 each, which was furnished. The penalty for the offense is a fine ranging from \$25 to \$200 and a jail sentence from five to thirty days.

**Broken Bones Pierce Flesh**

A. Bushey, a ranch hand at the Porfly place, met with a peculiar accident on Monday that may cost him his life. Bushey was saddling a horse and had put the saddle on but had left the bridle on the ground back of the animal. While he was stooping down to pick it up the horse reared backward and fell upon the old man breaking both bones of the right leg below the knee and crushing the ankle of the other foot. Bushey is in a serious condition. When picked up after the accident the bones of the right leg were found protruding through the flesh, making what the doctors call a compound fracture. Dr. Belknap, who is attending Bushey, says that the chances for recovery are against his patient.
