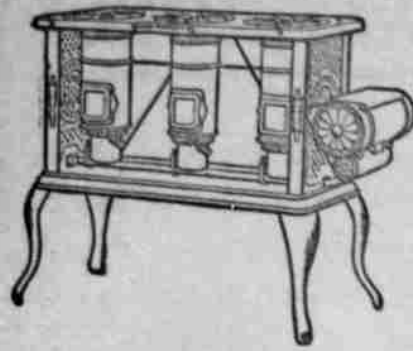

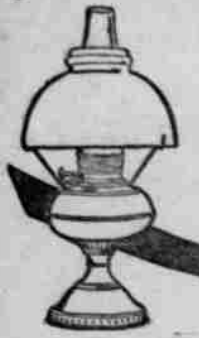

IN DEFENSE OF THE WOMEN

A Culver Correspondent Takes Rev. Clarence Wilson To Task.

ED. CROOK COUNTY JOURNAL:

The article by the Rev. Clarence True Wilson in last week's Journal on Woman's Suffrage seems to me pretty "rank." Why did not the anti have it published sooner, so as to give women a chance to defend themselves?

Does Rev. Wilson mean to make the assertion that if a woman is a club-woman that she is also immoral or lacking in virtue? When we read of a preacher going wrong, as we often do, is the woman in the case a club-woman? Far from it. She is one of the modest "unassuming queens" of some other man's home!

A woman who would sell her virtue for a political office would sell her virtue for anything else she happened to want, such as a position in society, or even to be the leader in church circles. A woman who holds her virtue so lightly does not need to go into politics to find a buyer. If she wants notoriety she can find it in plenty of other ways. In Utah, where so many women "club together and have one man between them" the reverend gentleman must remember that the church controls both their morals and their politics. Hence the results.

So politics is corrupt in the four states where women vote? If I am

not mistaken the women of Colorado elected a preacher as governor? Has he done nothing to purify politics in that state? Does Rev. Wilson wish us to believe that if he appointed any woman as his aids, clerks, etc., that they had to "offer their all at his shrine" in order to get the position? If so, it is good proof that politics and religion should not mix if the reverend gentleman's morals should fall so low as to cause him to prey on women who need the offices, or rather the salary, so as to make an honest living for herself, and perhaps her aged parents or her fatherless children.

In every county in Oregon there are more or less women employed in our court houses, some as assistant county clerks, deputies, stenographers, etc. The closing part of Mr. Wilson's argument is an open insult to each and every one of them. If the "political bosses" are so low as he asserts they are, it is time they were ousted and decent men were put in their places, and so long as the women cannot help matters by their votes it is up to such men as the Rev. Wilson to show us how it is to be done.

If she is fitted to hold a political office why should she be denied the right to do so, or be insulted by those who know nothing about her, morally or otherwise. When a young lady applies to the school board for a position as teacher must she "offer up her all?" The argument fits all cases of that kind.

I am glad the majority of us have more faith in the moral decency of our men and women than the Rev. Wilson and the anti-suffragists have.
