

# TAFT IS NOMINATED

Received 702 Votes on First Ballot  
—Amid Great Enthusiasm Was Named as Republican Standard Bearer

Chicago, June 19.—Amid wild enthusiasm Secretary of War William H. Taft was nominated for President of the United States on the first ballot with 702 votes, by the National Republican Convention, this (Friday) morning. His running-mate has not yet been chosen.

## Shaniko Wool Sales.

Over a Million Pounds Sold at an Average Price of 15 Cents.

At the second auction wool sales at Shaniko Tuesday over a million pounds of wool were sold at prices that averaged close to 15 cents. Some of the growers got 16 1/2 cents while a few received but 10 1/2 and 11, but the average price right through was the highest paid for the Oregon clip this season. Yancey Bros. got 14 1/2 for their clip, A. P. Jones 13 1/2, Morrow & Keenan 14 1/2, Harris & Miller 12 1/2, Porfily 10 1/2, Wm. Adams 12, Taylor & McCoin 11. A special to the Oregonians says:

At the second auction wool sales Shaniko has re-established its reputation for being the best wool market in the state. Over a million pounds were sold at prices that averaged fully 15 cents. The range of prices on the 35 clips sold were from 10 to 16 1/2 cents. This is an advance of about 15 per cent over the prices paid on June 2, the first sale day, and is due chiefly to the superior condition and quality of the wools offered.

Jacob Kasser, with an exceptionally choice lot of 35,000 pounds, leads the growers at 16 1/2 cents, while J. Mogren with 45,000 pounds runs a close second at 16 1/2 cents. Reeder & Fisher sold their 55,000 at 15 1/2 cents, and F. W. Durbin took the same for his 22,000. The John Thornton estate wool, 13,000 pounds, brought 15 1/2 cents.

Among the largest lots sold were R. R. Hinton, 107,000; Prineville Land & Livestock Company, 95,000; Morrow & Keenan, 78,000; Hilton & Burgess, 71,000; Frank Gabel, 78,000; F. A. Young, 100,000.

All the wools offered were sold with the single exception of one lot of 55,000 belonging to the Black Butte Land & Livestock Company of Prineville, the offer of 10 1/2 being declined.

The next sales day scheduled for Shaniko is Tuesday, July 7.

## Railway to Crook County

### Shaniko Line to Be Extended to Prineville and Bend—Local Men Back Project

Crook county is about to be joined by bands of steel to the outside world. Local men of wealth and influence are behind a plan to extend the Shaniko line to Prineville and Bend. A committee composed of Roscoe Howard, manager of the D. I. & P. Co., C. M. Redfield, chief engineer D. I. & P. Co., John Steidl of the Central Oregon Development Company, A. C. Sanford of Madras, Frank Forest and George O'Neil of O'Neil, L. Enderud, secretary of the B. S. & L. Co. of Haystack, meet the business men of Prineville today to take up the proposition of extending the Shaniko branch of the O. R. N. to Prineville and Bend. Our business men have indorsed the project and will do all they can to aid in the work. Portland capital and the Portland Chamber of Commerce are also behind the plan to develop this country.

It will be a steam road. The plan is to build to Bolters, bond that for 60 per cent of its value, then with this money build to Madras, then to Lamonta, and from that point to Prineville and Bend. Work is expected to begin within the next thirty days.

#### SPECIAL TERM.

#### SPECIAL SESSION.

I, the undersigned, Judge in and for Crook County, Oregon, do hereby call a special session of the County Court for Crook County, State of Oregon, for the transaction of county business, to-wit: For the purpose of receiving the abstract of the vote, and declaring the result thereof, on the question of the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, for the entire county of Crook, and for any subdivisions thereof, as may be voted upon at the regular election to be held on June 1, 1908, within said Crook county. Said special term is hereby called for aforesaid purposes to meet at the courthouse in Prineville, Oregon, on Friday, the 12th day of June, 1908, at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon of said day, and the Clerk of this court is hereby directed to notify S. S. Stearns and R. H. Bayley, county commissioners in and for said Crook County, of this order, as required by law.

In the matter of the vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for the entire County of Crook, held June 1, 1908.

Now at this time this matter coming on to be heard upon the abstract of the votes cast at the general election held June 1, 1908, in said Crook County, Oregon, upon the question "Vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for entire county of Crook," and it appearing to us from the abstract of votes, and the Court finds therefrom, that the result of such vote upon said question resulted as follows:

For prohibition, 1160 votes; Against prohibition, 529 votes; majority for prohibition 631 votes for entire county of Crook. Therefore it is ordered, adjudged and directed, that on and after July 1, 1908, in the entire county of Crook, and it hereby is absolutely prohibited to sell, exchange, give away or in any manner dispose of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes within said Crook County, Oregon, except as provided for by the Local Option Laws, Chapter 2, pages 41 and 53, inclusive, of the session laws of the state of Oregon for the year 1905, until such time as the qualified voters of said Crook County, as a legal election held for that purpose by a majority vote decide otherwise.

And it is further ordered and directed that the clerk of this court cause this order of prohibition to be duly published in the Crook County Journal.

In the matter of the vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for the

entire county of Crook, and for subdivisions of Crook county, consisting of precincts Kutcher and Haystack.

Now at this time this matter coming on to be heard upon the abstract of the votes cast at the general election held June 1, 1908, in said Crook County, Oregon, upon the question "Vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for entire county of Crook, and for subdivisions of Crook county consisting of Kutcher and Haystack precincts," and it appearing to us from said abstract of votes, and the Court finds therefrom, that the result of such vote upon said question resulted as follows:

For prohibition 189 votes. Against prohibition 79 votes. Majority for prohibition 110 votes for said Kutcher and Haystack precincts.

Therefore it is ordered, adjudged and directed, that on and after July 1, 1908, in said precincts of Kutcher and Haystack, Crook county, Oregon, and it hereby is absolutely prohibited to sell, exchange, give away or in any manner dispose of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes within said Kutcher and Haystack precincts, Crook county, Oregon, except as provided for by the Local Option Laws, Chapter 2, pages 41 and 53, inclusive, of the session laws of the State of Oregon for the year 1905, until such time as the qualified voters of said Kutcher and Haystack precincts, at a legal election held for that purpose, by a majority vote decide otherwise. And it is further ordered and directed that the clerk of this court cause this order of prohibition to be duly published in the Crook County Journal.

In the matter of the vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for the entire county of Crook and for subdivision of Crook county, consisting of Beaver Creek precinct.

Now at this time this matter coming on to be heard upon the abstract of the votes cast at the general election held June 1, 1908, in said Crook County, Oregon, upon the question, "Vote for or against prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for entire County of Crook, and for subdivision of Crook County consisting of Beaver Creek precinct," and it appearing to us from said abstract of votes, and the Court finds therefrom, that the result of such vote upon said question resulted as follows:

For prohibition 33 votes. Against prohibition 14 votes. Majority for prohibition 19 votes for said Beaver Creek precinct.

Therefore it is ordered, adjudged and directed, that on and after July 1, 1908, in said Beaver Creek precinct, Crook county, Oregon, and it hereby is absolutely prohibited to sell, exchange or give away or in any manner dispose of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes within said Beaver Creek precinct, Crook County, Oregon, except as provided by the Local Option Laws, Chapter 2, pages 41 and 53, inclusive, of the session laws of the State of Oregon for the year 1905, until such time as the qualified voters of said Beaver Creek precinct, at a legal election held for that purpose by a majority vote decide otherwise. And it is further ordered and directed that the clerk of this court cause this order of prohibition to be duly published in the Crook County Journal.

Thereupon there appearing no further business for the purposes for which this special term of Court was called, the Court thereupon adjourned.
