

The New Forest Division

On the first of July that part of the Cascade National Forest east of the Deschutes river and now known as the Fremont division of the Cascade National Forest will be included with the western division of the Blue Mountains National Forest and will be under the direction of the Prineville office. This will constitute one of the largest divisions of Uncle Sam's timber culture in Oregon. The new creation will be known as the Deschutes National Forest and will reach from a point south of Rosland to the John Day country. The total area will be double that which is under the supervision of the Prineville office at the present time and will double the work and relative importance of the local office.

B. F. Johnson has been promoted to the position of acting supervisor and will have charge of the office during Mr. Ireland's absence, which will be the greater part of this year.

Father Hickey's Accident.

From reliable information to hand we learn that the Rev. Father Hickey who met with such a severe accident in Redmond on the evening of the 26th of May last is recovering but very slowly from his wounds and is unable to use his right arm. The reverend gentleman is, however, we are assured, very bright and cheerful and only regrets his enforced inactivity. He is under the care of one of Portland's best surgeons, Dr. Andrew C. Smith, whose skillful treatment must surely bring out his patient all right. Father Hickey hopes to be able to visit Prineville, Paulina and Bend as he had promised, by the middle or end of July. He is devoted to the people of these districts and they in return hold him in affectionate esteem.

Leg Crushed.

C. J. Sundquist was the victim of a painful accident last Friday. When going up the hill just this side of Madras with his freight team, he got down to fix the brake on the wagon. His team started and he was thrown to the ground where one of the wheels ran over his right leg, shattering the bone between the foot and the knee. The wagon also passed over his right hand and arm, tearing the flesh off the arm and badly bruising the hand. He was taken to his home eight miles north of town where he is reported as slowly improving.

RAILROAD INCORPORATED.

(Continued from page 1) course that has been adopted by the business men and farmers of Bend, Prineville, Madras and other points. With an initial capital of \$50,000 they propose to construct a railroad from Shaniko, the Columbia Southern terminus, to Bend 90 miles.

"The people of Crook county have grown tired waiting for railroad companies to do something toward giving Central Oregon transportation, and they are going to start in to build their own road," said Jesse Stearns, counsel for the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company. "The Willow Creek Basin last year produced 1,500,000 bushels of grain. The population and crop output are rapidly increasing year after year. The rains this year have helped conditions, and there is promise of another great crop next Fall. The people are freighting everything in and out of the country, 100 miles and further. They are getting tired. They have long deserved a transportation line from the existing roads, but they are still hauling their products to the nearest railroad at Shaniko."

Portland Capital to Help.

"The city of Portland has an opportunity here to do something real for Central Oregon. It seems to us that the capitalists of Portland should be willing to do as much for their own state people as they would do for the Harriman railroad companies."

"On a certain occasion when a dinner brought the railroad people and the capitalists of Portland together the latter offered to take the necessary bonds to finance an extension of the Columbia Southern from Shaniko to Bend. The railroad company did not accept

the offer. The people of Crook county now come forward with an offer to build the line and if the capitalists of Portland will make their former proposition good the road can easily be put through from Shaniko to Bend.

"The farmers are determined to go to extremes in an effort to get this line. They will get out with their teams and scrapers, and will furnish feed and do everything that can be done within reason to push this project through. The road can be built, and with reasonable assistance from Portland capital it can be built quickly."

It is said an easy grade, the maximum of which will be 2.3 per cent, has been found via Ward Creek, and there will be no serious difficulty in constructing the line from Shaniko southward. Some surveys have been made by Chief Engineer Redfield, of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company, who assisted in the construction of the original Columbia Southern. He has reported that it is practical to build a line that will serve present needs of Central Oregon.

The distance from Shaniko to Madras is 42 miles. With the line carried south even that far Central Oregon would derive a large benefit.

The Columbia Southern railroad was built from Biggs to Shaniko largely through the energy of a few men and the efforts of the farmers along the route. The demand for the road was so strong that it could not be resisted. It was constructed in the face of opposition from the O. R. & N. company, whose officials persisted in the assertion that the road could not be made to pay expenses.

In spite of these mistaken opinions the Columbia Southern has been a profit earner from the start. Traffic in Central Oregon has vastly increased since that time. It is known that an extension of the Columbia Southern to Bend would be a profitable line. That it would extend Portland's trade and develop the territory directly tributary to the city is undisputed. Under existing Oregon laws such a line could secure equitable traffic arrangements with the Columbia Southern.

To the Public.

In order that none may be ignorant of the provisions of the law regarding the disposition of liquor in prohibition territory, the Law and Order League authorize the publication of the following excerpts from the local option law. Section 2 provides that alcoholic stimulants may be sold as medicine in case of actual sickness, "but such stimulants shall only be sold upon the written prescription of a regular practicing physician, dated and signed by him and certified to on his honor, that he, the physician, has personally examined the applicant, naming him, and that he finds him actually sick and in need of the stimulant prescribed as medicine; provided, that a physician who does not follow the practice of medicine as a principal and usual calling shall not be authorized to give the prescription provided for in this section; and provided further, that no person shall be person permitted to sell more than once on the prescription, nor shall any person be permitted to sell at all on the prescription of a physician not herein authorized to give it, nor on a prescription which is not dated, signed and certified as above required; provided, that every person selling such stimulants upon the prescription herein provided for shall cancel such prescription by endorsing thereon the word 'canceled' and the date of cancellation, and shall file the same away."

Section 15 also provides that any person who shall "sell, exchange, or give away, with a purpose of evading the provisions of this law, any intoxicating liquors, whatsoever or in any way violate the provisions of this law, shall be subject to prosecution by information or indictment, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than ten nor more than thirty days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

Realizing that, in order to obtain the benefits of prohibition, the law must be enforced to the letter, the Law and Order League offers a standing reward of \$25 for evidence leading to each and every conviction. By order of the Law and Order League of Crook County.
