W. W. Brown of Fife, arrived on the Burns' stage Tuesday evening and left the following morning for Portland.

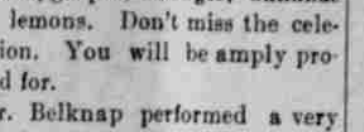
