The county court has granted permission for the telephone company to use certain roads under specified conditions. The route finally decided upon for the main line runs from Winnek's store in Prineville to the upper McKay school house by way of the east side of the McKay county road. Each stockholder in the association will be required to put in about one mile of line, but if the membership increases, as is reasonably anticipated, probably half a mile of line will be enough for each man to build.

The forestry office in Prineville takes exception to a statement contained in the Journal last week anent the use of a foresters' exchange fourteen miles up McKay creek, near the site of the old mill. The Journal got its information from the president of the telephone company that communication with Portland was to be had over a foresters' line running along the summit of the Blue mountains and thence across the more level country to the base of Mt. Hood. This line does not exist.

At Saturday's meeting the telephone company decided to obtain communication with Portland by way of Shaniko.
