### FENCES WILL DIVIDE CATTLE FROM SHEEP ON RANGES

This Is Plan Announced by Forest Supervisor Ireland---Stockmen to Decide on Lines

The most important stockmen's meeting ever held in Prineville was called to order this morning by Supervisor A. S. Ireland. Many cattle and sheep men with grazing interests in the Deschutes national forest reserve were present and much interest was manifested.

Committees were appointed to decide upon lines between the sheep and cattle interests in the reserves, and Mr. Ireland announced that fences would be built next year on lines decided upon by these committees, making the action of the committees one of permanent effect.
