Oregon in Grip of Boreal Blasts

Winter Descends on Prineville and
Other Beaver State Cities
With Capricious Weather.

This is the time of year when winter starts in earnest and with the variety of weather old Crook has experienced during the past week or ten days it will be interesting to know how Oregon fares as a State.

In Prineville, a week ago today it snowed, Saturday it cleared and Monday it clouded up again, partly clearing Tuesday forenoon, after another inch of snow early Tuesday morning. Wednesday it was very cloudy, auguring a big rain or snowstorm, though the temperature stood at 38 degrees above zero. Last Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday the temperature here was the coldest for December in 10 years, touching 3 below zero and hovering near zero for 96 hours.

Harney County News: The weather clerk has been trying to keep up a pleasing diversity the past week—a little snow, a little thaw, some frost and lots of bright sunshine. The winter so far has been delightful, but more snow is wanted.

Sherman County Observer: The snow, the snow, the beautiful snow, covered the earth handsomely in Sherman county, Tuesday night, and is still with us. Cold.

Antelope Herald: A touch of Winter this morning, with the mercury at zero.

Lake County Examiner: The weather the past week has been somewhat colder. Last Wednesday night the mercury got so low as 14 degrees above zero. Thursday night it was 28 above and hung around that vicinity until Tuesday morning it got down to 4 degrees above, and that is going some in this country. Last year the coldest all winter was only 7 above zero. The days are sunny and fine. Eastern people here think the weather glorious, but the old timers shiver, shake their heads, and get out an extra pair of socks. Maybe we will do that, too, later. But not now!
