but will not be far out of the way. As no pay rolls were kept and the men employed had a running account with the roadmaster, as well as the foreman, it has made it rather difficult to keep each piece of improvement segregated.

I would suggest that your Court require all people handling road money to take receipt from all persons when paying them as an original voucher to file with their records.

The records just examined have no receipts for any amounts expended with a few exceptions, depending on cancelled bank checks for a receipt. As a cancelled check is in the nature of personal property of the roadmaster, the county is without vouchers to have been overlooked no doubt from the long custom of handling this matter by county warrants.

In the statement of expenditures you will find an item "amounts not segregated" of the sum of \$1274.75. These are amounts that were impossible to tell from the records at hand just which district they were expended in.

Would call your attention to the amount of salary as shown in this statement of the roadmaster in the year 1907 he drew only \$1007.55 leaving a balance, apparently, due him of \$192.45.

Did not find where any salary was paid him for months of November and December. Also there has only been paid him the sum of \$1183.00 for year 1908 leaving a balance due him of \$200.00 for that year.

Also the roadmaster has paid himself for year of 1908 the sum of \$177.00 for the use of his team separate from his salary.

The various foremen of the road work have not filed vouchers, either for the amount expended by them, and which they have received from the roadmaster and the county will have to depend upon the testimony of them, in case of a claim for wages, provided such a condition should arise. There appears in warrants drawn Jan. term 1908 on general fund for amounts covering roadmasters salary for November and December 1907. This will cover item above mentioned.

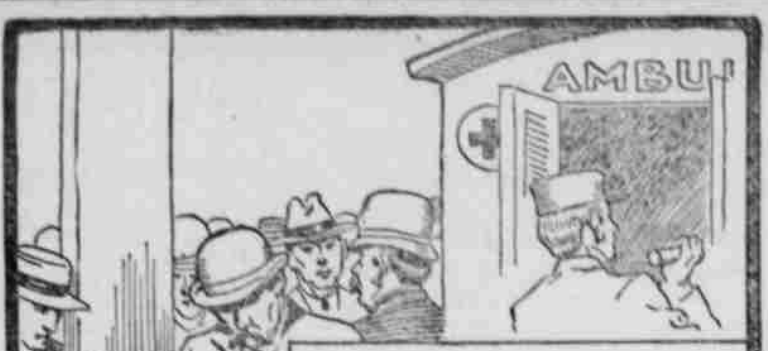
Referring to the item in my original report herewith pretending to the salary of the roadmaster for the year 1908, upon further investigation and with more information I find that roadmaster's check No 66, dated June 26, 1908, for \$80.00, and which I credited to salary, should be for claim of roadmaster for team hire for months of March, April and May of same year making the amount due roadmaster for salary for December \$100.00 instead of \$20.00 as I reported and the amount paid himself for use of team to be \$27.00 instead of \$17.00 as my original report shows. There was nothing on record to show that this was for any other service than the regular salary checks and without other information than what record showed would naturally suppose same was for salary. The item of \$18.10 for stationery, stamps, etc.,

found on his report is correct as shown by his memorandum account kept of such matters and has not been paid. The treasurer's receipt for the balance paid by Mr. McLaughlin of the above amounts and the heavy bill referred to amounting to \$164.49 is herewith exhibited and a duplicate filed with the county clerk.
