## Educational Rally to Be Held in Madras

An educational rally will be held at Madras on Friday and Saturday, February 19 and 20, by Supt. R. A. Ford, assisted by many other educators of the county. It is the intention to make the meeting a most interesting and profitable one. All of the teachers in the Crook County High School, the Prineville public school, and the schools of Laidlaw and Bend will attend to assist in the work, and the request is made by the superintendent that all of the teachers and members of the school boards of the districts embraced in the territory north of Crooked river and east of the Deschutes attend. Matters of interest to the general welfare of the public schools will be discussed and it is planned to have a joint session of all the school officers and teachers present on Saturday, the 20th. As Washington's Birthday, Feb. 22, falls on Monday of the following week, Superintendent Ford will ask all of the schools in the county to observe Friday, the 19th as the holiday, so as to allow all who desire to attend the meeting at Madras, also avoiding breaking into the work of the next school week with a holiday.

## Two More Railroads for Central Oregon

Two more railroads threaten to cross Central Oregon. One of these is an electric road sponsored by the Portland, Baker City & Butte Electric railroad company, which filed incorporation papers in Multnomah county last week capitalized at \$2,000,000, which says it will equip and operate "a railroad with either steam or electric motive power between Portland and Butte Mont., running southeasterly through Clackamas county to the confluence of Trout creek with the Deschutes river thence east and northeasterly to Burnt Ranch in Wheeler county, and from there to Baker City, and from Baker City the railroad will cross Idaho running in a northeasterly direction to Butte which will be the eastern terminus of the road."

The other road is one built jointly by the states of Idaho and Oregon with state aid from Coos Bay through Central Oregon to Boise, Idaho, as proposed by the Idaho-Oregon Development Congress which was in session at Salem during the past week.

as much as the case was brought in the name of the people of the state of Oregon, thus placing the case properly under the control of the district attorney. This authority was not obtained and Deputy Bell acted within his legal powers in dismissing the case. However, the aggrieved party still has recourse to the grand jury, but whether the case will be brought before that body is not known.

Howell's case before the city recorder brought out a large number of spectators, who were interested in the developments of the proceedings. Attorney M. R. Elliott represented the city of Prineville, and Attorney George Barnes the defendant. Four or five witnesses were called on each side and at the close of the taking of evidence the recorder found defendant guilty as charged and imposed the fine and costs as above stated.

In this connection it was brought out that there is a city ordinance to the effect that no fees can be collected by witnesses called in the recorder's court. The attorneys present gave it as their opinion that no one could be compelled to testify before the court and that it would not stand in common law. Fees were allowed the witnesses in this case.

## Teachers Examining Board Named

Superintendent Ford announces that the examining board for the teachers examinations for February 10 to 13 will be composed of Mrs. C. W. Ekins of Prineville, Miss Cora Ferguson, of Bend, and Superintendent Ford, himself. Writing for county papers will cover three days, beginning on Wednesday, the 10th. The work on the state papers will run over another day, finishing on Saturday the 13th.

## COLD STORAGE PLANT.

\$4000 and \$5000. In connection pure artificial ice could be manufactured and sold, Mr. Horigan believes that such a plant would be profitable from the start. Besides providing cold storage for meats and making possible the curing of hams and bacon the year round, butter and creamery products, as well as eggs and fruits could also be properly cared for.

Regarding the production of pure artificial ice it would seem that a limited amount could be disposed of at a premium. While the ice harvest here is usually good, it is secured from the local streams the waters of which are none too pure, and this natural ice is hardly fit to put into drink ing water.

The first requisite of a cold storage plant would be a suitable building, brick or stone being preferred. There are many varieties of machinery used in different plants, but most of those in operation in the United States employ ammonia gas in connection with a brine made of chloride of lime and water. By a series of operations the gas is evaporated, liquified and compressed, at the same time being carried through pipes distributed over the room which is to be cooled. These physical changes produce the cold, and the same ammonia gas is used over and over again, the power being employed in the pumping and compressing only. In calculations the work of one ton of coal is considered equal to from 8 to 14 tons of ice. Five or six horse power would be sufficient for the operation of a small plant.

The different temperatures at which different articles are preserved in cold storage may be of interest. Beef and other fresh meats are subjected to about from 32 degrees to 40 degrees Fahrenheit and it requires from 24 to 48 hours to get out the animal heat at this temperature. About four weeks cold storage makes beef much better than that freshly killed.

Butter is kept at zero, fruits at about 50 degrees and eggs at about 40 degrees.

Cold storage is also coming into much use as a means of preserving furs and carpets as well as winter clothing from destruction by moths. These firms in Prineville produce most of the local pork; viz:

D. F. Stewart, Horigan & Still and Stroud Bros. Mr. Stewart kills and cures about 100 head of hogs annually raising his own hogs and feeding them at the flouring mill. He cures his meat by his own process, using put little salt-peter. He says the main point in curing meat is to give it plenty of time. The packing house meats as a rule are forced in the curing process, which destroy the sweet flavor.

Horigan & Still kill about 250 head of hogs each year. Their meats are sugar cured, and all of the home cured meats excel the imported in quality.

Stroud Bros. figure they will kill about 350 hogs during the season. Most of these are made into hams and bacon.

The Journal does not urge the immediate establishment of a cold storage plant in Prineville on a large scale. It simply presents this matter to its reader for what it is worth, believing that it is worthy of investigation; that such an enterprise would be profitable; that it would keep at home many thousands of dollars every year and give a boost to the hog business in Crook county.

If wheat and alfalfa can be turned into a profit by feeding it to hogs, what is the use of hauling the grain to Shaniko a distance of 40 to 60 miles, and then hauling in hams, bacon and lard, on the return trip? It would not take much figuring to see that \$4000 or \$5000 could be made in a short time by saving first cost and freight expense on this one item of pork products in Crook county.
