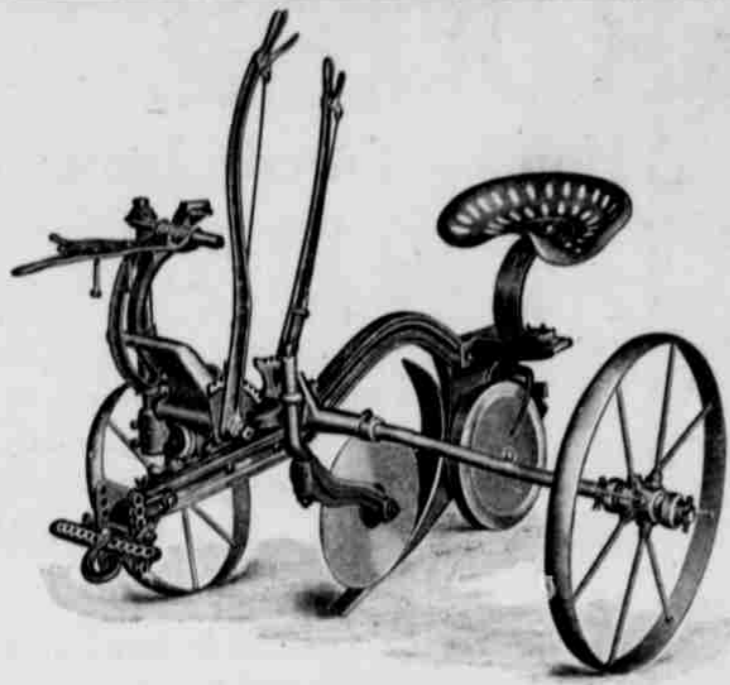

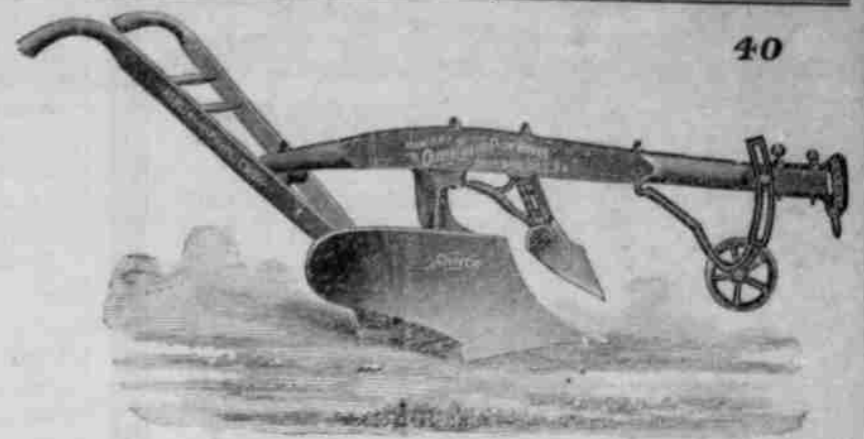

Dog Tax Ordinance Only Likely One

At the next regular meeting of the city council March 2 there will probably be consideration of an ordinance regarding the dog tax question, but this is not definitely announced. If there is to be any other city legislation, its nature can not be learned at this time. Marshal Wade Huston is interested in the passage of a law that will enable the city to better control minors with respect to their spending their evenings about town when they ought to be at home attending to their school studies. The curfew ordinance provides that all children under 18 years shall be off the streets after the curfew rings at 7 o'clock, but this measure is easily side stepped by the boys going to the billiard halls and other places that are deemed injurious to their development into useful citizens, and to their school studies. The marshal wants an ordinance making it unlawful for minors to frequent these

amusement joints. This view of the matter is also strongly favored by the principals and teachers of the high school and public schools, but there is nothing certain about these ideas being enacted in the form of an ordinance.
