### Bear Creek Shooting.

Continued from first page.

to get another gun. I jumped to the door, found him with a shotgun, putting two shells in, and he could not get the break down quick enough. I jumped in. He swung the gun around and hit me on the right side of the head three-fourths of an inch above the ear with the muzzle thereof. Bettie was coming in behind. She said, "I'll kill the son-of-a-b----". C. H. Erickson and I were clinched. I saw then I had to do something. I had hold of his gun with my left hand and aimed to shoot his wrist with my right hand. I had my pistol drawn when I jumped into the house. It is a .38 caliber Iver-Johnson, five shot. C. H. Erickson dropped his shot gun after I had fired two shots in quick succession. I picked it up and the automatic rifle with it, took the two guns under my left arm, my pistol in my right hand and started for home. I thought they might catch me. I stopped and threw the shells out of both guns. There were two loaded shells in the shot gun and one loaded shell in the barrel of the automatic rifle and two in its magazine. I didn't know that the defendants had any other guns so I took it rather surely. I was off about 25 or 30 rods when I heard the report of a gun. Bettie Erickson hallooed, "Drop them guns," and Bettie Erickson and C. H. Erickson were coming on the run toward me. I started on a run toward home and from them. During this race C. H. Erickson shot eight shots at me. The bullets fell right at my feet at odd times, one went so close to my ear that I felt the wind of it. In my judgment it was a .22 rifle. They chased me about 80 rods from the cabin. They went back. Bettie Erickson unhitched a black horse from the wagon got on the horse, went across Bear Creek to the opposite side from where I was. I went home, threw the automatic rifle and the shotgun on the bed and told my wife to hide them. I started then across Bear Creek toward George Taylor's. I was on foot. I went about a half a mile. I sat down under a juniper to rest and sat there about fifteen minutes when Bettie Erickson's dog came across little Bear Creek. I looked up and saw Bettie Erickson on a black horse coming toward me. I got up and ran down toward George Taylor's from her. When I got opposite a vacant house known as Slim's house, she began to fire at me. I couldn't say how many shots she fired at me, but it must have been eight or nine. It was the same gun in my judgment that they used when firing upon me on my way home from the cabin. I went to George Taylor's. Bettie Erickson circled to my left in the direction of where J. E. Roberts lives. She followed me so far as I saw up to the time of the shooting a mile and a half, and I went on to George Taylor's. I stayed at George Taylor's awhile and afterwards started for the George Knox place, but went to Ed Harris' place and there met J. E. Roberts and John Milliron and they went with me home. We stayed there last night and I and Mr. Roberts came to Prineville this morning.

When I arrived at the cabin the defendants were standing, Bettie Erickson in the cabin door and C. H. Erickson leaning against the wheel of the wagon four feet in front of the door. This cabin is on my land and it was about nine o'clock yesterday morning when I arrived at the cabin. My horse was still tied to the corral when I left there. My wife's name is Mary. LEONARD WALTERS. 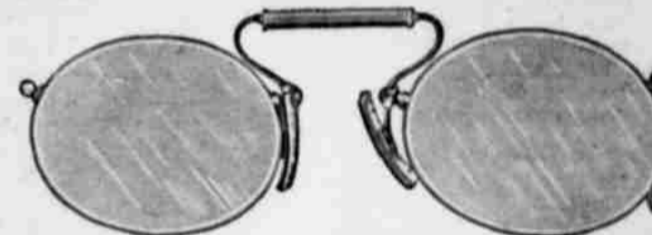

To Charles E.
