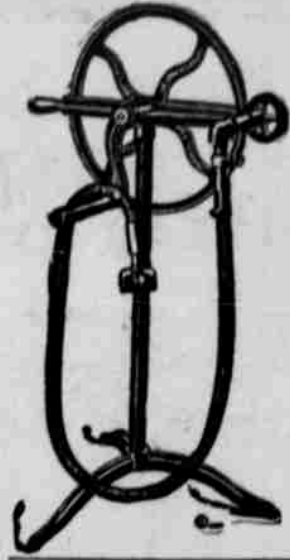

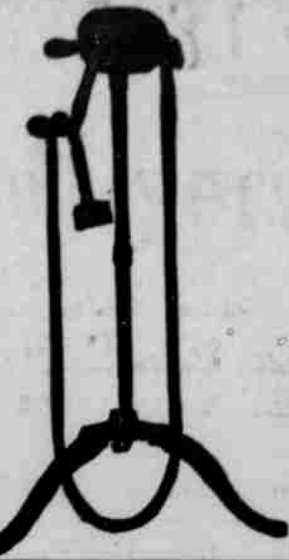

## Court House Notes.

The big clock in the new court house lower was started this morning and was set standard time from Shaniko. Some of the panes of glass forming the dial were broken in shipment. New ones have been ordered. The weight which operates the clock weighs 100 pounds. It hangs by a wire cable and has a fall of 12 1/2 feet. The weight passing through this distance keeps the clock running 7 1/2 days. It will have to be wound once a week.

Theodore Mingers, one of the plumbers employed on the work in the new court house, arrived today to put on the finishing touches.

The plasterers finished their work and have gone. The second story is almost finished with the exception of laying the flooring. The door casings, window casings, wainscoting, etc., are in place and the doors are being hung. The floor now in the building will be smoothed up and covered with felt. On top of this the floor will be laid. The painters are rapidly finishing the outside of the building.
