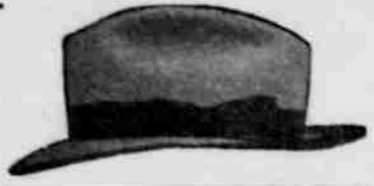

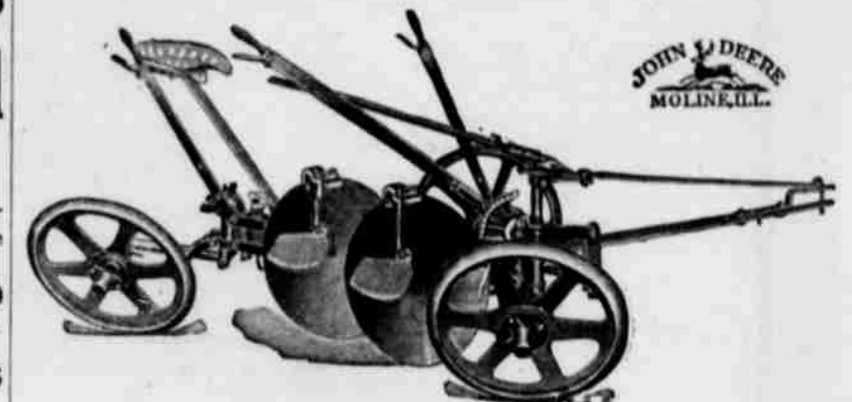

## Referendum Filed on Beer Ordinance

The referendum petition holding up the city ordinance recently passed by the city council prohibiting the sale of "near beer" has been filed with City Recorder Shattuck. This petition was signed several weeks ago but was not filed until the first of the week. This annuls the law until it is accepted by a vote of the citizens, which vote will be taken next December.  
Speculation is now rife as to what is going to happen in the way of ordinances. There is a rumor that the council will pass another ordinance at the meeting next Tuesday night. Others say that the city will stand on the old ordinance which provides for \$500 license. Nobody can be found who knows what is going to be done about it. In the meantime the near beer flows.

## Development Work at Tetherow Bridge

Joseph G. Houston, who is promoting the new development company which is commencing operations at Tetherow Bridge on the Deschutes, was in town today and returned to the scene of work this afternoon. The company has laid off a towpath on the river and has secured the right of way for the construction of an irrigating ditch which will carry sufficient water to irrigate about 5000 acres.  
This project was at first undertaken with the idea of locating a Dutch colony on the land, but negotiations with the colony people are now at an end, and the land will be disposed of to individual settlers.

At present the company only has about 2000 acres in the flat which can be irrigated, located at the point locally known as Eddy Flat, the land formerly being embraced in desert claims taken by Earl McLaughlin, T. H. Lafollette and others.

The Spoo sawmill which is being constructed near the new townsite has not yet been put in operation, there having been some hitch in getting the boiler out from Shaniko. Mr. Spoo is now in the valley looking after business in connection with the mill.

## Paulina Water Right Case.

Testimony in the case of T. H. Brennan vs. F. M. and J. L. Smith and John Davin, all of Paulina, is being taken this week before Miss Beulah Crooks, referee, at W. A. Bell's office. This suit was commenced in June 1908, and is for the purpose of deciding a water controversy for water taken from Trout Creek in the Paulina valley. It includes a question which is now before the supreme court and which has not been yet decided, viz: What were the rights of water users prior to 1877. Mr. Brennan owns what is known as the old Charley Elkins place and the suit is brought to restrain the defendants from interfering with the flow of water in an irrigating ditch, which was established prior to 1877. Mr. Brennan is represented by Attorney Bell and the defendants by Attorney M. R. Elliott.

## Good News for May Race Meet.

Encouraging news is being received almost every day regarding the coming of race horses for the meeting at the Fair Grounds at Prineville in the latter part of May. Lee Galbraith has written that he expects to start from Independence soon with three racers, "Kamsack", "Misty Pride" and a two-year-old.

C. A. Bedell, who is now at Burns, will be here with "Wade Hampton" and two other flyers, which he has purchased.

"Brandy" will be here from Paulina.  
"John H." and "Trump," another local horse that will be tried out by Bill Pollard, are now at the track stables in training for the meet. Judging from the early responses now being received there will be a dandy lot of racers here for the spring meet.
