The New Scalp

Bounty Law

There appears to be a general lack of understanding regarding the provisions of the new scalp bounty law among the hunters and ranchers of Crook county, and County Clerk Brown says that claimants for the bounties are making demands on him for bounty warrants in many cases, when they have not complied with the law as to the manner of presenting their claims. The law plainly states what proceedings shall be taken and for fear that there is not a full understanding of its provisions we print herewith sections 1 and 2 of the act, covering that portion prescribing the manner of taking the scalps and hides from the animals and presenting them to the clerk:

Section 1. There shall be paid by the State of Oregon and the counties thereof as in this act and in the manner hereinafter provided for the killing and destruction of the following named animals, hereafter killed in the State of Oregon, the following bounties: For each coyote or coyote pup, \$1.50; for each gray wolf or black wolf, \$5.00; for each gray wolf pup, black wolf pup, timber wolf or timber wolf pup, \$2.50; for each bob cat, wild cat or lynx, \$2.00;

for each mountain lion, panther or cougar, \$10.00.

Section 2. Any person killing any of the aforesaid animals in order to obtain the bounty provided for in Section 1 of this act, shall within six months of the date of the killing, present to the county clerk of the county in which said animal or animals, have been killed, the entire skin of each of said animal or animals, which skin includes and must have attached thereto all four of the paws, or feet, the tail and the skin of the entire head, including both ears thereof, eye holes, and skin to tip of nose; and shall at the same time make and file with the said county clerk an affidavit which shall be sworn to before said officer, and which said affidavit shall state: (1) the kind of animal or animals from which said skin or skins were taken and the number of skins so presented; (2) that the county in which said animal or animals were killed in [is] the county in which their skins are presented for payment of a bounty; (3) that said animal or animals from which said skins were taken were not brought or received, dead or alive, from any other county or state; (4) that said animals were killed on or after the first day of February, one thousand, nine hundred and nine, and within six months from the date of making of said affidavit; (5) that said animal or animals were killed by the person presenting such skin or skins in such county and in the State of Oregon, and (6) that the same were not fostered or whelped in captivity prior to the killing thereof; and in addition thereto there shall be attached and made a part thereof, the affidavit of a resident taxpayer of said county, setting forth that he is a resident and taxpayer of said county, giving his postoffice address and stating that he is personally acquainted with the applicant; that he has read the affidavit of the applicant, presenting said skin or skins, and that he believes the same to be true in every particular.

The said county clerk may, if he deems it advisable, require of such applicant for bounty such other corroborative testimony as to him seems proper concerning the truth set forth in such affidavit; provided, that when in doubt as to the kind of skin or skins presented, whether wolf or coyote, the warrant shall be issued for the lesser bounty.
