Ranchers Explain About New Road

Say Madras Merchants Oppose It for Selfish Reasons.

Madras, Ore., April 19, 1930.
To the Editor of the Journal:
At the next session of the county court a petition for a county road will be presented, beginning at a point on what is known as the Tillman Reiter road just north of Lamonta and running in a northerly direction to the Fred Fisher county road one mile south of Youngs post-office. There will also probably be presented a remonstrance against this proposed road. We, the petitioners for this road, respectfully ask the Journal to give us space to set forth the matter from our view point, as the agitation of this road matter has developed a very peculiar state of affairs.

The petition was prepared by the parties residing on the desired road and signed by those living on or tributary to it. No special effort was made in circulating the petition, however, 90 names were secured asking that it be granted. Many more could have been secured, but the time was short and no opposition was expected. The promoters of the road interviewed every land holder whose place was touched or crossed by the road, with one or possibly two exceptions. This one exception opposed the road very bitterly at first, but after the matter was thoroughly explained to him, finally agreed not to oppose the road, if some changes would be made to suit his convenience, which was done.

Most of the petitioners for this road have no road, and live from one to five miles from any county road. Naturally in common with the rest of humanity they desire to get in and out sometimes. This proposed route is traveled most of the way at present, but is becoming difficult on the account of numerous gates, and it is only a question of time until some rancher will close the roadway.

It will not only be a great benefit, but a positive necessity to the ranchers who will be obliged to get in and out, but will be used by hundreds of others as a shorter and better route to the timber and sawmills from all of the Agency Plains country. It will also make the most convenient route to Prineville from this section, a fact that will be appreciated by the farmers here if they are obliged to haul their wheat to Prineville to the mill to get a "square deal," as was the case last year. And, lastly, it furnishes a better and more direct route for all the travel to most of the Central Oregon points.

The above reasons for the granting of the road also furnish the reasons for the opposition. A remonstrance is being circulated by the merchants of Madras. While in the remonstrance they may charge the expense and impracticability of the road, the real reason of their opposition is that the road, if granted, may be traveled to such an extent that Madras may lose some of the loose change taken from the inland travel that now goes through that town. It is not the desire of the petitioners to injure Madras, as that is their town, and heretofore most of them have done their trading there, and they recognize that the town depends upon the transient travel. But many of the people here do not feel called upon to go without county roads, or to be obliged to go twice the distance to reach a given point, just to accommodate a few men who wish to lay tribute on all the travel that goes into Central Oregon, compelling them to spend an extra half day on the road just in order to go through Madras, so that the barns and merchants there can pick up a few paltry nickels.

Now if this road is to be like the remonstrators will probably tell the court, of no use to anyone except those who live on or near it, why not let them have it. It will be the only road they will have, and if they are contented to use it and are making such an effort to get it, they are surely entitled to it.

The cost of this road to the county will be scarcely anything. There will not be a great deal of work to do, as much of the road is now open. About \$200 worth of work has been volunteered and signed for, besides the work that is called for from the petitioners, and since signing the petition, many have volunteered work in opening the highway. The people here are in earnest about this matter, and if the road is not granted, it will be hard to make them believe that justice has not miscarried.

Those signing the remonstrance are residents of Madras and those living south and west of there, these for the most part living from 5 to 15 miles from the road and are not acquainted with its merits or demerits,

but just sign at the request of their merchants, as it does not cost anything to sign a remonstrance.

The one exception referred to above that agreed not to oppose the road has broken faith with the promoters and is trying to get his neighbors to sign the remonstrance. Before he came in possession of the place where he lives and through which the road will pass, several of the farmers clubbed together and dug a well and installed a pump, as this is a place where water can be obtained at a shallow depth. The above farmers have dry farms and haul water from this well. But the owner of the land now threatens to forbid them to haul water any longer, if they will not sign the remonstrance; so if he should close his place to the public, many would be shut off from water, wood, and a way to get to the sawmills. These facts make it all the more necessary for the granting of this road.

The merchants and press of Madras have from time to time referred to Prineville as being a "hog," and wanting everything, but we have not yet heard of Prineville trying to make every road center at that place in disregard of the rights and convenience of everyone. We consider that we should have the right and a road to go on—to go to Prineville whenever the occasion or inclination demands. A PETITIONER.
