This pest is a soft worm which attacks the sprouting seeds in the ground and eats the kernel out, the ravages being more noticeable in the light soil than in heavier, estimated damage from this cause being in some instances as high as 50 per cent. Blighting winds and blowing sand are also said to be adding their damage to the growing grains.

### Telephone Offices Will Be Moved

Arrangements are being made by Supt. L. R. Robertson of the Pioneer Telephone Co., to remove the Prineville central office from its present location to the new quarters over Adamson's drug store. Three rooms will be occupied in the new location—one for the public, one for Mr. Robertson's office and the other for the operators. Connection will be had between the operating room and the public office by window. A long distance booth will be constructed in the front office. From the First National Bank corner to the Adamson building a cable carrying about fifty wires will be installed and the bank corner will be the distributing point for the city lines.

The announcement is also made that the Pioneer line to Howard will be put in repair, and that the proposed new line which was to be built by the Ocho Independent company will not be constructed. Jack Summers has been working on the Howard line during the past week.
