C. C. Hutchinson, known as the father of irrigation in the West, and the originator of the reclamation work in Crook county, died at his home in Portland last Monday, aged 75 years. Death was due to old age. Mr. Hutchinson was well known to many Crook county people. After selling his irrigation interests at Bend he went into southeastern part of the state and was one of the first to interest the government in the possibilities of reclamation in that region.

## Miscreants Cutting Fences Near Post

Last week, sometime between Monday and Friday morning, a party of unknown men, presumably three, judging from the tracks, cut and mutilated about two miles of fence surrounding some road land which was leased by George Wiley and John Pickett, and also about three miles of fence surrounding a section of road land leased by It. Booten and son. The wire was cut in some places, on each side of the post and again in the middle. In other places the wire was cut only in the middle. Five or six wire gates were cut up into small pieces and tossed aside. In some of the roughest country a short string of fence would not be cut, but in the main it was pretty badly cut up.

This is only one of a series of depredations of a like nature which have been committed during the past few years upon honest and law-abiding citizens residing in that community. No relief from these outrages has yet been found for a definite clue is hard to find. It is hoped, however, that in the near future something may be done to put an end to such outrages.

## Portion of Civil Cases Heard in Court

On account of lack of space the Journal is able to give only the result of those cases of civil nature acted upon by the circuit court of most interest this week. The remainder will appear next issue.

In the case of the Clinton National Bank vs. John Atkinson, et al, which was the Bismark stallion case, the jury returned a verdict for the defendants. Motion for new trial was overruled. W. E. Bogue vs. Pearl May Bogue, divorce; decree granted. Malinda A. Robinson vs. J. W. Robinson, divorce; decree granted. A. R. Eastwood vs. R. E. Jones & Co.; referred to Beulah Crooks as referee to be heard in vacation. John Moore vs. Moses Niswonger; suit to collect for drilling a well at Powell Buttes. Jury verdict for defendants. New trial granted.

H. P. Belknap, J. W. Horgan et al vs. city of Prineville; suit to restrain special election on "near beer" ordinance. Argued and taken under advisement. A. H. Lippman vs. H. C. Ellis and officers of Crook county; injunction to restrain from purchase of furniture for new court house. County has till first day of next term to file answer.

C. C. Brix vs. J. F. Morris; suit to collect fees for making collections. Jury verdict for plaintiff in sum of \$30.

## High School's New Training Department

In order that the teachers of Crook county may have an opportunity to grow larger and broader, the Crook County High School has added a teachers' training course to its curriculum. This course is not a theoretical but a practical one, and actual teaching work will be done by the students under the supervision of a competent critic teacher. During the coming year, special attention will be given to the first three grades, as we feel that here our teachers are weakest and are most in need of intelligent and experienced advice.

For this work, the board has secured the services of Mrs. Wickersham, who is a graduate of the Oswego Normal, New York, and who has been critic teacher of the first three grades in the Ashland Normal for three years and last year was principal of the training department in the same school. She comes highly recommended, as having no superior in the state in her line of work. We feel that no teacher in Crook county who has not had special training for her work can afford to miss this opportunity offered by the Crook County High School.

Mrs. Wickersham will be here on the ninth of August to begin work, thus enabling those teachers who are attending the summer school to get a few weeks training in primary methods. While you will get much that will be helpful this short course, we would advise you, if possible, to attend the Crook County High School during the coming year and get the benefit of the entire year's course. There is a growing demand for instructors who are specialists, not only in English, history and science, but in first, second and third grade work; and it is to meet this demand that we are introducing this training course, which will fit the teachers for specialized grade work. Once more, teachers, let us urge you, for your own good and for the good of the schools of the county, to avail yourselves of this excellent opportunity to improve your teaching and increase your salary.

## Pilot Butte Telephone Will Wire Town

The Pilot Butte Telephone Co. is the name of a new organization that is reaching out over Crook county for business. It is consolidating and improving the former lines for the purpose of getting into closer touch with each other and with the county seat. Some idea may be gained of the extent of territory covered by the different farmers' lines which make up the new company when it is known that 115 or 120 telephones are in use.

In the Combs' Flat, Newsom creek and Post neighborhood there are 20 'phones.

There is a barbed wire line doing service from Paulina to Stewart's on which there are 18 instruments.

From Paulina to Beaver there are about 12 'phones.

From Stewart's to Buck creek there are 25. The line connects at this point with the Burns wire.

In the Rye Grass neighborhood there are 20 'phones and from 15 to 20 in the McKay district.

J. H. Kelly and G. C. Price were in town Saturday for the purpose of seeing what could be done toward installing the service in Prineville. They will take the matter up with our merchants and if enough instruments are ordered the company will begin to wire the town in about thirty days.
