
County Court.

plea of "not guilty" case was continued for the term.
State vs. Emmett Holman. Holman could not be located; a bench warrant has been issued for him.
State vs. George T. Rowan. Demurrer to indictment was sustained for the reason that the indictment named May 21, 1909, as the date of offense, when it should have been March 21. This was plainly a clerical error, but was vital, and the indictment was dismissed.
A. B. Estebenet was indicted on two counts of selling liquor. He was tried on one charge and found guilty by the jury. Then it was discovered that the defendant had not been arraigned to plead to the indictment so that the trial was thrown out. Upon being arraigned Estebenet pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and serve 20 days in jail. The other indictment is still held against him.
A test indictment was returned by the grand jury against Dr. J. T. Guerin of Bend, charging him with a violation of the local option law, in that he issued a prescription for whiskey when he was not a regularly practicing physician. H. S. Wilson, Guerin's attorney, demurred to the indictment and Judge Bradshaw sustained the demurrer. The points brought out in this case were that the indictment charged Dr. Guerin with issuing a prescription for whiskey, which did not conform to the requirements of the local option law. The judge ruled that in that case the defendant had not violated the law, as such a prescription did not authorize any druggist or other person to sell liquor, and if any whiskey was purchased through the prescription which did not conform to the law, the person who sold the liquor was the one who violated the law, and not the doctor who issued the prescription.

tem of land records which will amount to a present ownership book and whereby double assessments will be avoided and much land be placed on the roll which has not been on before, fully justifying the expense of installing it.
We would make the following recommendations:
Because of the exposed condition of the books and records in the old building, we urge they be moved into the new building as soon as suitable furniture can be procured.
That the county clerk be supplied with two new recording typewriters.
That the school superintendent be allowed clerk hire while he is necessarily absent from his office on official duty, not to exceed \$100.
We further recommend that where prisoners are in the custody of the sheriff that they be actually confined within the jail as required by law, and urgently denounce the custom existing heretofore in allowing prisoners the freedom of the court house yard and going about and upon the streets of Prineville.
Having completed all matters coming before us, we ask to be discharged from further duties upon this court. Respectfully submitted,
