Haycreek Wool Clip Brings Highest Price

At the second wool sale of the season here June 1, about 750,000 pounds was sold at prices ranging from 15 to 22 1/2 cents. The famous Baldwin Sheep & Land Company's clip of 330,000 pounds brought the highest price of the season, namely, 22 1/2 cents.

Among the other sales was the clip of Morrow & Keenan, 80,000 pounds, on which J. P. Dufour and Charles H. Green were tied at 20 1/2 cents.

Other clips offered and sold were: Henry Wakerly, 33,000 pounds, at 21 1/2 cents; James Connolly, 33,000 pounds, at 20 1/2 cents; Malone Estate, 85,000 pounds, at 22 cents; T. A. Connolly, 50,000 pounds, at 22 1/2 cents; Miller & Harris, 22,000 pounds, at 15 cents.

The principal buyers of the day were Charles H. Green, Edwin J. Burke, J. P. Dufour, William Ellery.

The next sales here will be on June 15 and 20. There is yet un sold at this point about 1,125,000 pounds.—Oregonian.

Prof. Schafer Makes Scholarly Address

Joseph Schafer, professor of history at the University of Oregon at Eugene, delighted his hearers with a scholarly address, which was the principal feature of the high school commencement exercises held at the club hall last Friday evening. Prof. Schafer talked along the line of "Fundamentals," showing the prime necessity of laying a good foundation. He held up as the essential thing in good judgment, the discernment of the fundamental and important points in any problem confronted, aside from those of lesser importance.

After the opening number on the program by Morgan's orchestra, Rev. C. P. Bailey offered prayer, then the treble clef club of the high school sang the chorus, "Out in the Fields."

Prof. Schafer then delivered his address, which was followed by Miss Catharine Conway's vocal solo, "The Mission of a Rose."

County Superintendent R. A. Ford, on behalf of the high school board, presented the diplomas to the graduates, eight in number, and in addition presented to Edgar Roy Barnes a scholarship in Whitman College, valued at \$200, Mr. Barnes having attained the best grades and highest honors of his class.

The exercises closed with a selection from the orchestra, followed by the benediction by Rev. J. D. Lewellen.

After the exercises at the hall the guest of honor, Prof. Schafer, the members of the class, Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Williamson, the members of the faculty and Supt. Ford repaired to the Hotel Prineville, where a banquet was served.
