### LOCAL MENTION

F. C. Rowlee was in town Tuesday from the Johnston ranch near Bend.

A marriage license has been issued to Jos. W. McClay and Alina M. Archer, both of Redmond.

W. H. Kilmer and wife were in town on business Monday, from their home east of Madras.

Wm. H. Porter made final proof on his homestead on the McKay before County Clerk Brown Tuesday.

At the school election held Monday Mrs. W. A. Bell was elected to succeed herself. M. R. Elliott was re-appointed clerk.

A. L. Mackintosh returned from Portland the first of the week and spent a few days in Prineville before returning to his home at Paulina.

H. J. Healy of Haystack, was in town Tuesday. Mr. Healy stated while in town that the recent rains were not as heavy in his section as in some neighborhoods in the county.

County Clerk Warren Brown says that his office is out of bounty warrant blanks just at present, and that parties having scraps may bring the same in, but that he cannot issue warrants for same until his supplies arrive.

County Superintendent of Schools R. A. Ford left Prineville today on his way to Salem to attend the annual convention of county school superintendents which meets at the capital Monday, June 28. After attending this session he expects to go on to Albany to attend the State Teachers' Association. The state laws require the state superintendent to hold the annual convention of superintendents and the county superintendents are required to attend. The program for the convention sent out by Supt. Ackerman includes the discussion of 25 topics all of great interest to educators.

The appeal for a new trial in the case of C. H. Erickson and wife, who were found guilty in the last session of the Circuit court for Crook county, is now filed in the supreme court of Oregon. Erickson's attorney, Geo. W. Barnes, states that the work of the court is now 18 months behind and that it will probably be that long before the case ever comes up for a hearing, which will be at Pendleton. The appeal of C. Sam Smith which was taken last year immediately after the May term of court has never yet been argued. Attorney Barnes says that it will probably receive the consideration of the court next month.

Walter T. Morris, forest guard, was in town from Post Tuesday, making proof on a desert claim which he holds there.

Asa W. Benton of Corvallis, who formerly worked for W. F. Klug, came in yesterday to prove up on his timber claim. Mr. Benton's claim hung fire in the land office for a long time and consequently he proves up under the old law.

Mrs. Cora Chapman has been engaged by the board of directors of the Redmond school to teach a nine-months school in that district, beginning on the first Monday in September. Her contract with the district officers is now on file with the county superintendent and is the first to be filed for the coming year.
