a wagon road down the hill so they can establish camp on the river.

The estimated cost of the wagon road is \$7000.

#### Railroad Ready to Make Good.

In an interview published in the Oregonian, General Manager J. P. O'Brien said regarding the work: "Our intention is to show that we are prepared to make good, and are already doing so. If the Government fails to pass on our maps for the concluding stretches of the road we may safely be able to pass the situation up to someone else. The railroad means right and is doing right, but this continual fumbling and fussing with red tape by Government departments is excessively annoying."

#### May Have Private Information.

A general impression is current among Harriman officials that from private sources it has been learned the final appropriation of the maps will not long be delayed. As the 40 miles of the railroad already approved are through an absolutely destitute country, and even the southern terminus of the 40 miles now in course of construction, or in the initial stages thereof, is practically unproductive from a railroad point of view, it is thought Harriman officials mean to go on with necessary preliminary work, in the hope that the showing of energy will result in the rapid approval of the maps and the consequent rushing of construction work.

The 40 miles of track are estimated to cost approximately \$1,500,000 and any change in the situation affecting the road will be followed by the immediate expenditure of the greater part of this amount and by the hastening of large contractor's crews to the scene of action.

At present no contract has ever been let or asked for the road, the preliminary grading and construction being confined to the actual Harriman forces. It is generally understood that no contract will be let until Mr. O'Brien has control of every foot of right of way necessary for the construction of the entire road up the Deschutes River.

#### May Acquire Oregon Trunk Surveys.

The Telegram of last Thursday says: A complete surveying outfit of about 50 men, engineers, surveyors, chainmen, rodmen, transitmen, stake and axmen and the usual number of "jerries," was dispatched by the O. R. & N. for Shanks this morning. This is the crew that is heading into Central Oregon to re-run the surveys of the upper reaches of the Oregon Trunk Line from about Madras, from which point they will probably work both ways.

Although such intentions are persistently denied by Mr. Boschke, it is understood from reliable sources that he will have his own men work over certain sections of Oregon Trunk Line rights of way with a view of verifying data which indicates that the Oregon Trunk has much more favorable locations than Mr. Boschke's forces have been able to secure. This applies particularly to the upper reaches of the two contending projects.

(The divergence of the two surveys begins at the mouth of Trout Creek. The Oregon Trunk survey follows the Deschutes river, and begins to climb just below the Warm Springs ferry in order to make the grade into Willow Creek Canyon, which it follows to Madras, coming out of the gorge on a level with the flat comprising the Madras townsite. The Harriman survey swings up Trout creek to the Sage Brush Springs vicinity, then detours to make the climb onto the south end of Agency Plains, which it crosses just west of Madras and spans Willow creek gorge with a long bridge several hundred feet above the level of the townsite. It is said that the grades of the Oregon Trunk runs from Trout Creek to Madras on a 1.2 per cent grade with 8 degree curves, while the grades on the Harriman surveys have gradients of 1.5 per cent and with curvature of 15 degrees at certain points.)

The Oregon Trunk has a further advantage as it taps at much closer range a highly productive territory in the Warm Springs Reservation and the Matolee timber belt.

The reputed object of the Harriman engineers in running over their rival's lines is to determine to a nicety just how much more favorable the Oregon Trunk Line surveys are. If it is found that they are sufficiently superior it is almost certain that negotiations of some sort will be opened up between the rival railroad projectors with a view of amicable settlement of the strategic controversy, as it is admitted that it would be worse than folly for both lines to be built into Central Oregon at this time. Porter Bros., who built the North Bank, are said to control the Oregon Trunk, but as yet they have shown no disposition to make overtures to Harriman, or suggest any terms under which peace may be obtained.

The question of which survey the railroad is to follow is an important one to the residents and property owners at Madras. The Oregon Trunk survey is the much more desirable. To apply the conditions to Prineville, it would be a choice between a road passing through the townsite, or one skirting the rim rock at the head of the grade on the Bend road, although the distance is less at Madras.

While the Harriman people will rush work on the first 40 miles of the new road up the Deschutes with all possible speed, says the Telegram, it is not probable that any contract for the work will

be let, in spite of the story of the Seattle Times. The only semblance of truth in the Seattle report which said that General Manager O'Brien had let the \$5,000,000 contract to Twoby Bros., of Spokane, is that this contracting firm had a complete camp equipment, grading outfit and other paraphernalia available at Spokane, and arrangements were made by the Harriman construction department to have Twoby Bros. send in their outfit and prosecute the building of the road under what is known as the "force account" plan. In other words Twoby Bros. will continue to work on the first section of the road piecemeal or by the day, until the remaining right-of-way on the lower section of the road have been secured and until the survey maps for the three upper sections of 90 miles have been approved by the Secretary of the Interior. Even then a large part of the new line is likely to be built under the present plan under which Twoby Bros. are working. This may or may not cover the entire \$2,000,000 estimate for the first 40 miles from the mouth of the Deschutes to Sherar's Bridge.

It was stated by General Manager O'Brien that it would be out of the question for the company to entertain any proposition looking toward the letting of a contract with the Central Oregon project in its present situation. Simply as a matter of convenience and to avoid any further delay in getting work under way, the "force account" deal was made with the Twobys.

As soon as the contractors had been instructed to go ahead with the work they called in a number of sub-contractors and it is said, opened negotiations with them to take some of the prospective work off their hands. It is known that the Twobys did take the matter up with some other contractors with whom they had worked in building the North Bank road.

"I suppose that is how the Seattle story arose," said Mr. O'Brien, "for there is nothing in the statement that we have let any contract. The Twobys probably informed the subcontractors that they had prospects of getting more or less of the construction work to do and were looking into the future. But this is merely a surmise on our part. All we have done is to get a construction crew into the field under the most satisfactory arrangements that could be made, so that there would be no more delays. The work can now go on while the Government is unwinding the red tape over the survey maps for the upper sections of the road, and while we are securing what rights of way we still need."
