#### START THE WINTER RIGHT.

"A poor beginning makes a good ending" when a man starts with a cent and ends with a million, but a start with rumpy birds in November often means a smashup by December.

"What's wrong with my cockerels?" In September they were a show bird picture, and now their tails are crooked and heads are flop.

"Your birds have lost ambition to hold their tails straight because they have rumpy colds."

A start with colds often knocks a winter's prospects into a cocked hat, and all because some fellows won't learn to keep stock from running in cold fall rains, slopping in frosty mud and exposure to frosty air currents.

Then there's that old sniffer that starts to cough up rump microbes when the first frost comes. She's a case of spare the air and spoil your success. She's worse at starting a flock to sneeze than the boys who most made you sneeze the top of your head off at school with red pepper.

Now, some old stagers can stand such knocks. They are canavalsacks in cold rains and seem immune to the contaminating influence of that old disease breeder you've been footin' enough to keep. But what of those beautiful pullets whose combs begin to bloom like roses, who are singing their fondley, who are making their first debut with their telltale red splashed egg? Your winter egg sales at top notch prices depend on those young hens that are seeing their first snow. You can't sell rumpy roasters and keep a reliable reputation. You don't want to be worrying, losing, doctoring or digging graves all winter. Just remember—

The hens that start the year with cold  
Are shy on bringing in the gold.  
The hen that puts her foot to snow  
Will fall to make the business good.

#### ALL WHITE FEATHERED FOWLS.

Breeders of market chickens should sit up and take notice that the world's demand is swinging round to white feathered fowls.

The day is near when egg farms will be run entirely by the champion S. C. White Leghorn "egg machines."

Flesh producers will also discard solid black, partridge and any color but white. If they answer the demand their market poultry will be mostly White Rocks, White Dottes and White Oringtons. This also means that the coming poultry show will not be "fancy," but "utility," not a foolish judging of "barred to the skin" and "seven feathers to a rooster's tail," but

the judging of fine fancy flesh and eggs.

The revolution is in full swing across the pond and already here.

It's going to be all Pekin ducks, Embury geese and White Housers too.

And why? Simply a kick against dark pinfeathers. For this, the customer doesn't want dark fowls, the city dealer neither, and the pickers are also kicking, and, render, if you have to eat pinfeathers, you want them white too.

To test this, just take similar size White and Barred Rocks to market in separate crates and note how quickly the Whites go in preference to the Barred.

Sorry to jar you if you keep dark fowls, but it's up to you to join in or get left.

#### DON'TS.

Don't imagine so called "white squabs" are all white feathered. Their skin is made livid by fat and their parents are mostly Blue Housers.

Don't write us concerning the book "Diseases and Enemies of Poultry." There was one free issue, and all were snapped up the year ago. Anything free goes except the religion of "quit your meanness."

#### RE-ENFORCED CONCRETE.

Material Proves a Success in Construction of Boats.

The utilization of re-enforced concrete as a construction material for various purposes for which masonry, wood or iron work has been previously employed has undergone considerable development during the past few years. One of the most novel applications of the system, however, is that which has been evolved and perfected by a well known Italian engineer, Signor Carlo Gabellini of Rome—namely, its adoption for the construction of boats and floating structures in general, such as pontoons, floating bridges, and so forth.

The system of construction is very simple. The keel is laid in the usual manner, the iron rod re-enforcement being anchored to the armoring of the former and being brought up the sides of the hull in conformity with the desired lines of the craft. The iron rod generally used has a diameter of about



four-tenths of an inch. Expanded metal which has a mesh of about two-tenths inch is stretched between the vertical supports, to which it is attached by suitable metal clips. The concrete is then applied to the skeleton fabric in layers inside and out equally, the thickness of this sheathing varying according to the dimensions of the craft.

The system has been utilized for the peculiarly shaped boats which serve to support the decks of the quantum floating bridges to be found on the river Po. Hitherto wooden boats have been strung across the waterway, the deck planking built in sections, being laid transversely across them. The boats are of peculiar design, having sharp pointed rising ends. In such re-enforced concrete the same general lines are preserved, only the ends are made blunter, a greater midship beam is provided, while they have perfectly flat bottoms, forming a kind of pontoon. Each boat is forty-five feet in length, with a beam of twelve feet and a depth of 3.6 feet. So satisfactory have the craft proved in service, the absence of repairs being a pre-eminently distinguishing feature, that the wooden boats for these quantum floating bridges are being superseded by the re-enforced concrete craft as rapidly as possible, over a hundred having already been built for this service.
