Big Sums Change Hands for Cattle

Never in the history of Crook county, for a given length of time, has so much money changed hands for livestock as within the past month. The sum is greater than the total amount of last year. What has been the cause? Well, various reasons are given. Some want to retire from the business, others are short of hay and still others who believe that it will not pay to feed \$10 or \$12 hay to stock. Just how much this selling movement will affect the future of the cattle industry in Crook county is hard to say.

Ed Willard, a Portland buyer, has been investing heavily in Crook county livestock. He has three bunches of cattle now on the road to Shaniko and about 200 head of beef stuff feeding in the neighborhood of Prineville. He bought 1300 at the head of the south fork of Crooked river, Camp creek and Hampton buttes.

Among those who have made sales are: Sanders Logan, 200 cows and calves; Hackerman & Pfeffer, Gilchrist Bros., cows; George Wiley, cows and steers; B. Bennett, cows; L. Bennett, cows; Columbus Johnson, 130 cows and steers; Randolph Gibson Ed Laughlin of Swamp creek, Jim Beckley and others.

Among the buyers, besides Mr. Willard, might be mentioned Henry Cram, Oliver Powell, Ed Slayton, Willis Brown and Roe Grimes, C. Sam Smith. All of the foregoing are buying feeders, with the exception of Mr. Willard, who will ship some and feed others.

We are credibly informed that 2000 head of cattle have been bought in Crook county during the past thirty days at prices ranging from \$27 for cows to \$40 for steers. A good many head were bought under contract to be delivered next spring, so that an approximation of the number could only be obtained. It is thought that Crook county growers are richer to the tune of \$100,000 at the very least for cattle transfers thus far this fall.

Rodman Indicted for Manslaughter

Frank E. Rodman and Mrs. Hazel Maddux were accused by the grand jury of killing Mrs. May Real in the early morning of August 5, in the mysterious automobile accident on the Linnton road, just outside the city limits. The investigating body framed its accusation into a charge of manslaughter which was set forth in an indictment, a true bill for which was presented to Presiding Judge Bronaugh, of the Circuit court on Monday, says the Oregonian.

Failure to exercise the proper caution in the operation of an automobile, thereby rendering them criminally liable for the killing of Mrs. Real, is the ground on which the indictment against Rodman and Mrs. Maddux is drawn. Both the accused will be arraigned before Judge Bennett in the Municipal court for their preliminary hearing. Their conviction under the charge is a question involving considerable doubt. The fatality having occurred outside the city limits, the automobilists would therefore come under the provisions of the state law regulating the speed of automobiles, which permits 25 miles an hour on public roads except when within the limits of village, town or city, when it is then required to be reduced to eight miles an hour. There has been nothing in evidence to show that the car which killed Mrs. Real was exceeding the prescribed 25 miles an hour.

The unaccountable silence of both Mrs. Maddux and Rodman remained unbroken yesterday on the advice of their counsel, Attorneys Logan and Caldwell. The impending ordeal which Mrs. Maddux faces in the courtroom has seemingly thrown no damper upon her spirits, for although she refused to discuss her case, she laughed and chatted gaily, as though she did not worry as to the outcome.

Rumors of a perfect alibi for Mrs. Maddux and for Rodman were circulated by their friends yesterday and it was said that when the case comes to court they will have witnesses to disprove the evidence already given before the grand jury. None of this new evidence for the defense, however, has been brought to light and, if it is produced, will come in the form of a new sensation in the case.

That there was some doubt, even in the minds of the jurymen, as to whether they might properly indict Mrs. Maddux and Rodman is evinced in their delay in making a report in the case. All of the evidence, which was conclusive in character, was before the jury at least four days ago and it was after this evidence was in their hands that it summoned Julius Meier without apparent cause.
