Opal City Is Name of New Townsite

Opal City is the name of a new townsite that is soon to be put on the market in Crook county. Joseph G. Houston, representing a Portland syndicate has purchased of Walter Mendenhall of Culver his 160-acre homestead on Yamhill flat, and the plat of the new city will be filed with the county clerk within the next few days. The land is on the line of both the Hill and Harriman surveys for the new railroads, and is said by those familiar with the lay of things to be one of the finest prospective townsites in Central Oregon. The price paid for the quarter section was \$4000. It is located on the south east slope of Juniper Butte above Opal Springs on Crooked river, hence the name Opal City.

Mr. Houston is the general manager of the Oden Falls development company and while this new venture is not a part of the Oden Falls project the promoters will reserve the water, light and power rights in the deeds of dedication, and expect to supply these utilities from the plant on the Deschutes. Mr. Houston is now in Prineville and is calling for bids for the construction of the power dam at Oden Falls. It is understood that County Commissioner Bayley may take the contract for constructing the dam.

In connection with the irrigation project it is the intention to reclaim the land on the peninsula between the Deschutes and Crooked rivers. Most all the land embraced in that tract has already been filed upon by Portland parties. The new townsite is located just across Crooked river from this land which it is proposed to irrigate.

Another feature of the plans which will be of the most interest to Prineville people is that a preliminary survey for an electric railway line will soon be made from Opal City to Prineville. The projected route skirts the base of Haystack mountain, runs north of Lamonta and swings through the gap below the oil well on the slope of Grizzly, thence across Poverty Flat to Prineville. Every foot of such a route would supply traffic for a line. Developments in this direction will be closely watched by Prineville people.

Psychology Lectures Please Audiences

Mrs. Frances Hewes of Denver, Colorado, has been in the city the past week lecturing on the New Psychology. Her pleasing personality and graceful manner of presenting her subject makes the truth she presents doubly forceful.

In her Sunday evening lecture, she especially dwelt upon the parable of the "talents," and the lesson drawn from this was an inspiration in itself.

On Monday evening she discussed "Physical, Mental and Spiritual Development." She emphasized the close association of the three and gave many suggestions, for the perfection of the spiritual as well as the mental and physical.

"Suggestive Therapeutics" was the subject Tuesday evening and in this lecture Miss Hewes brought out many scientific facts along the four lines of suggestion discussed. She especially dwelt upon "auto-suggestion" which occupies such a prominent place in recent scientific investigations. She gave many thoughts on this subject that will long be remembered by her hearers, for they were such as would be especially helpful to those who have ambitions and who have energy to strive to realize these ambitions. Her last lecture on "Love and Marriage, Holy and Unholy," emphasized the condition of the home, as it should be when affinitized love blesses it.

Forest Ranger Wins Recognition

Chas. S. Congleton, forest ranger, stands ace high with the forest service officials, and in recognition of his efficiency he has been called away from his regular duties in the Deschutes forest under Mr. Ireland and been put at special work inspecting "June 11" claims in other reserves in the Northwest. While this change does not include any raise in salary it is strictly in the line of a promotion.

Congleton had occasion in the regular discharge of his duties in this district to report on some homestead claims. It was these reports that attracted the attention of the superiors in the service to the boy in Crook county. The simplicity and clearness of the reports were just what the service was looking for, and now they have made verbatim copies of them and are sending them to every forest headquarters as models to follow in making out similar reports.

Ranger Congleton is now working under headquarters at Republic, Wash, and his duties will take him right along the line between Uncle Sam's property and that of Canada.
