John I. Springer, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Great Northern Railway, arrived in Prineville Monday to make an effort to arouse some interest in the fourth Led by C. H. We can bring these cups to Crook county. We raise the stuff and all you have to do is to get it ready and leave it it at the First National Bank of Prineville. Mr. Baldwin has been appointed a delegate to this congress by Governor Benson and will be on hand to look after the interests of Crook county. So anxious is Mr. Hill to get an exhibit from this country that he will pay express charges and your membership fee in order to get it. The time is short so get busy at once. 
