DATE OF FAIR IS APPROACHING

Secretary Is Ready to Record Entries

FARMERS MUST WORK, TOO

Successful Meet Is Expected—Entries Should Be Made Before the Rush.

Get your exhibits in early for the Crook County Fair. The secretary will be very glad to have entries in as soon as possible in order to ease up on the final rush. For some reason or other everyone seems to want to enter their particular animal or article at the same time, and this time is usually just the day before the fair opens; hence the secretary is always rushed off his feet at that time. Now is the time to enter; the secretary's office is located in the office of M. H. Biggs, one block east of the Prineville Hotel.

The date of the fair is October 19th to 23rd inclusive, and if any one has not yet had a poster posted up in

his neighborhood, they are invited to communicate with the secretary who will immediately rectify the omission. This year the posters were sent out rather later than usual, owing to the absence of the regular secretary, but this is only an added reason why all and sundry should assist in making this fair one of the best in the history of Crook county.

All farmers coming into Prineville from a distance are requested to see the secretary if the fair has not been advertised enough in their locality, and it is hoped that all out of town teams will not leave the city on Saturday without having a good sized poster tacked on to the wagon.

This is not a one-horse show—the success of the fair depends upon the out-of-town farmer. They alone have the power to make or mar it. Crook county is looking for a record show this year. Come yourself, bring your family, bring your exhibits, get your neighbors to do likewise. That is all that is needed. The fair will then be an unqualified success.

Remember the very last day for receiving entries is Monday the 18th of October—that is week from next Monday. Remember also that the secretary is ready right now to make entries. If you are in town on Saturday call and let him know that you are going to enter. If you are not coming to town soon, send in your entries by mail. SHOW JIM HILL OUR PRODUCTS

Great Northern Man Here After Exhibits

FOR FAIR AT BILLINGS, MONT.

Request Comes Direct From Lewis W. Hill—Help Put County on the Map.

John I. Springer, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Great Northern Railway, arrived in Prineville Monday to make an effort to arouse some interest in the fourth National Dry Farming Congress to be held at Billings, Montana, October 25, 27 and 28. Mr. Springer made this trip at the urgent request of Lewis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway.

James J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern, offers \$1000 in prizes and three silver cups as special prizes to farmers in Oregon, Washington and Montana. The only stipulation he makes is that the products must be grown within 25 miles of any of his lines. This, however, will not apply to Crook county. Mr. Hill considers all of this country tributary to his road so he invites the farmers, not only to make an exhibit of their products so that the outside world may know what can be grown here. So keen was his interest in this country that he had a special representative come here in one of Porter Bros' autos to make sure that something would be done. It is up to you. A few of these silver cups would look mighty fine on your sideboard. Here they are: A \$50 silver cup for the best individual display of farm products by any town or community in Oregon. Another \$35 silver cup is offered for the best individual exhibit of winter wheat, Turkey Red variety. Still another silver cup for the best individual exhibit of alfalfa seed. We can bring these cups to Crook county. We raise the stuff and all you have to do is to get it ready and leave it at the First National Bank of Prineville. Mr. Baldwin has been appointed a delegate to this congress by Governor Benson and will be on hand to look after the interests of Crook county. So anxious is Mr. Hill to get an exhibit from this country that he will pay express charges and your membership fee in order to get it. The time is short so get busy at once. Mr. Hill's offer is as follows:

James J. Hill's Offer.

One thousand dollars will be given for exhibits of farm products grown without irrigation and under dry farming methods in the states of Montana, Washington east of the Cascade mountains, and in Oregon in the Deschutes valley, entered at the fourth National Dry Farming Congress, to be held at Billings, Mont., October 25, 27 and 28, 1909. James J. Hill has offered \$1000 to be distributed as prizes.

These prizes are offered for exhibits grown without irrigation within 25 miles of any of the lines of the Great Northern Railway in the three states named above. Samples to be one peck each.

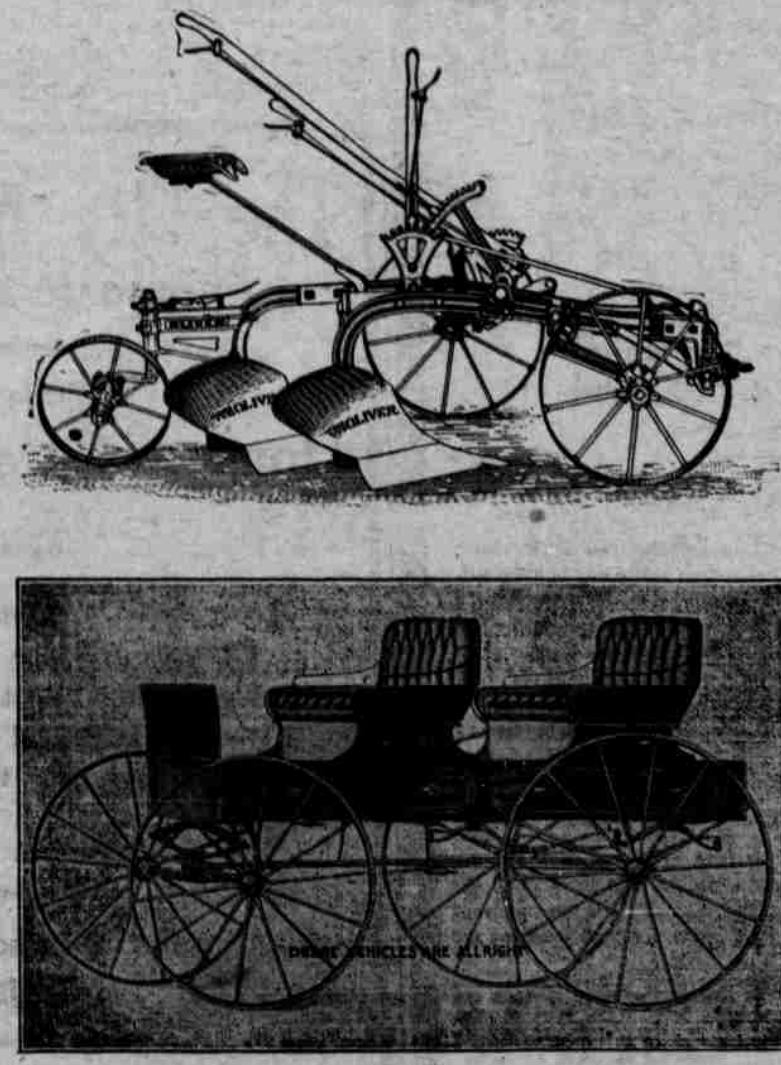
