### City Will Put Streets in Good Repair

The council met Tuesday evening with Mayor Stewart in the chair. There were present Councilmen Lippman, Shipp, Yancey, Cram and Adamson. Absent Councilman Clinton.

After the reading and approval of the minutes the usual routine was gone through.

The committee on streets and public improvements was given more time in which to report on the naming and lettering of streets in Newsom's third addition to Prineville.

The marshal was instructed to have the road scraper repaired so that it could be used.

The matter of having some work done on the streets received the approval of the council. While the city funds would not permit of anything extensive, yet it was felt that chackholes and other low places in the streets should be filled up and repaired. The committee on streets and public improvements were therefore instructed to go ahead with the work and were authorized to pay 50 cents a cubic yard for the necessary gravel. A. S. Collins came before the council and wanted to get permission to change the ditch of the Rye Grass Company on the north side. The matter was referred to the committee on public improvements with instructions to report at the next regular meeting.

Council adjourned.

### Rodman's Trial in November.

Mrs. Hazel Maddux and Frank E. Rodman, who have been indicted by the grand jury on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of May Real on the Linton road August 5, entered pleas of not guilty before Judge Bronaugh in the circuit court, and their cases were set down for trial in November. The cases will be heard separately, Rodman's being first on November 11, the trial of Mrs. Maddux will come up one week later.

### Incorporation of the C. W. Elkins Co.

That incorporation is the order of the day is exemplified by the recent changing of the big merchandising business of C. W. Elkins to an incorporation under the name of The C. W. Elkins Company. The transfer of the business took place on October 1. The company is incorporated for \$50,000, shares \$100 each. Besides the former owner, C. M. Elkins and Omer C. Claypool have taken stock in the new firm, and it is understood that others have subscribed for stock.

Regarding the new regime Mr. Elkins said to a Journal reporter: "We find our business growing so rapidly that we are obliged to shift some of the responsibilities of its management, and those carry the interests of the business better who have more than a mere salary in view."

Progress will be the watchword of the new firm, and that it will mean no empty phrase is evidenced by the installation of three up-to-date rapid cash carriers in the establishment, thereby saving time, errors and possible losses.

### Joe Smelzer Injured in Runaway Accident

Joe Smelzer and A. H. Kennedy experienced a runaway last Friday afternoon in the former's buckboard. They were watering the horse at the Ochoco ford under the bridge on Main street, when Sam Newsom passed over the bridge in his auto. The horse took fright and ran down the bed of the creek to the first cross street and then turned north, upsetting the rig and throwing the men out on the boulders. Mr. Kennedy was not much injured, but Mr. Smelzer, who is a heavy man, was thrown much farther, striking on his side and fracturing several ribs, besides sustaining other injuries, the exact nature of which has not yet been determined. Dr. Edwards was at the scene immediately after the accident, and Mr. Smelzer was taken in the doctor's car to the home of A. E. Gilliam, near by, where he has been in a serious condition ever since. A day or two ago he was improving nicely, but was worse again last night. Dr. Rosenbergl has had other physicians of the city in consultation on the case.

### Alphabet in Biblia Versa.
