Contract Is Let for Bridge Timbers

Another clincher in support of the announcement that the Hill road into the Deschutes valley is to be rushed to completion comes this week in the form of the letting of a contract for sawing and delivery of three million feet of bridge timbers along the company's right of way in this county.

This week M. Topfitt & Company purchased a timber claim on upper Willow creek and at once entered into a contract with Lou Hamilton for logging the timber and delivering it at the millsite on the claim, 10,000 feet per day for the first few weeks and 25,000 feet daily thereafter until 3,000,000 feet have been delivered.

The machinery for the sawmill, a big steam outfit, is now on the way in from Shaniko, and no time will be lost by the new company in putting it in operation. The timbers are to be cut from 14 to 20 feet in length. The contract provides for their delivery at any point along the Oregon Trunk line right of way.

Stage Company Will Incorporate

The property and business of the Cornett Stage & Stable Company has been purchased by J. H. and George Reams, who, together with a third party will incorporate under the old name with a capital of \$3000. The transfer includes all the stage stock of the lines, automobiles, etc., used in connection with the business, Mr. Cornett retaining all the real estate that he owns. The new management has already taken control, but the articles of incorporation have not been filed nor the formal transfer made. It is not known who will be associated with Reams brothers in the incorporation, and they do not know themselves as yet who the third incorporator will be. This company operates several hundred miles of stage lines in Central Oregon—the Prineville-Shaniko, Prineville-Silver Lake, and Prineville-Burns routes, all being under their control.
