## PRINEVILLE PASTOR SEES PRESIDENT

### Is Impressed With His Greatness at Once

### Taft's BIG STICK IS SMOOTH

### Winsome Smile Impresses and Brotherly Manner Wins—Has No Fear In Crowds.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 4, 1909.

Crook County Journal, Dear Sir: I had the privilege of seeing and hearing the President of the U. S. A., (W. H. Taft) at close range yesterday, while he was laying the corner stone of the First Universal church. The impressions that one gets of him are many and could not be told in a great number of words, so will not go much into details.

One is impressed first with his greatness for he is six by nine; six feet high and nine feet in circumference; (this is not necessarily a fact only an impression.) But putting all jokes aside when he steps on the platform one knows that a man of power is before him and when he stands speaking a great quietude prevails and all ears are open to drink in every word.

He is a remarkably clear and logical speaker, has a ready flow of good language sparkling with wit and easily holds his audience until the last word has been spoken.

His kind face and manly bearing causes one to think that a great big brother is to have a little talk with you personally, rather than a President of the best nation on earth was to deliver an address to a multitude of people.

While not as forcible a speaker as Roosevelt he displays a great deal of tact and judgment, and every word helps to clinch his hold upon the hearts of the people.

Undoubtedly he is a welder of the big stick, but it is not a rough one full of knots and thorns that breaks and tears with every blow.

It seems to be the smoothest kind of weapon covered with kid but the permanent good will likely be a greater length and more of a lasting benefit to the people of our great commonwealth.

His everywhere smile is natural and winsome, undoubtedly he was envied for it by the hordes of politicians that surrounded him.

As you study him you can't but help think that he is a politician of the old school, the kind that kisses the babies, jollies the ladies, and wins the men by showing an interest in whatever concerns them. He spoke in terms of highest praise of all churches and the work that was being done by them at home and abroad, intimating that it was his belief that they had been the greatest factor in giving us the 20th century civilization that we so much enjoy.

He shows a great confidence in the people and a fearlessness of spirit; the police had gone to some trouble to keep the crowd at the distance of the width of the street, but when he came he requested that they be allowed to close in and for the police to stand just below the platform from which the exercises took place.

Outside of the afternoon exercises his Sabbath was spent in a very simple way, in the morning declining invitations to worship in some of the larger and more stylish churches of the city, to meet with the people of his own faith (Unitarian) and enjoy a quiet hour with them. Summing it all up he is a noble man of a great people, and is well fitted in every manner to be their leader to prosperity and greater development. His winsome smile impresses and his brotherly manner wins. May he be spared by the Ruler of all nations to take us along to the milestone in nation building.
