**Broke Thirty-one Cycle Records.**  
At the race meet of the Los Angeles Motorcycle club recently something unparalleled in the history of racing occurred, the breaking of thirty-one world's records and the establishment of eight new records. In the last event, a one hour race, two amateurs between them accomplished the feat. Raymond Seymour broke the ten, twenty, twenty-one and twenty-two mile records in the same race. J. Howard Shafer passed him at this point and broke every world's record from twenty-three miles to forty-eight miles, establishing new records from forty-nine miles to fifty-six miles, and broke the world's one hour record by nearly eight miles. In addition to this, Paul J. G. Derkum rode a quarter of a mile in thirteen seconds, a feat never accomplished but once and which has no place in the record books.

### Athletic Cracks of the World to Meet.

With the Olympic games still under discussion, plans for athletic meets of almost as great importance are under way. The purpose is to give great track and field meets in Athens and Japan two years hence—a double set of world's games—so that the same team of Americans who will compose the team from the United States and exhibitions at many places other than in Greece and Japan. Further than this outline the plans have not been pushed. The information comes from President Sullivan of the A. A. U. through Porter, a member of the American Olympic team.

**Jones Against Double Umpire System.**  
Manager-Fielder Jones of the Chicago Americans does not think well of the double umpire system. Any plans that require an umpire to stand behind the pitcher in a poor one," said Jones, "for whenever an umpire stands in that position he obstructs the view of the outfielders to such an extent that they are forced to play out of their position by several feet. I do not like the plan of having the umpire on the diamond any place. The advantage of seeing the ball from behind the pitcher is more offset by the inconvenience and handicap imposed on the outfielders."
