### McLaughlin Elected City Recorder

Earl McLaughlin was elected city recorder at a special meeting of the council last Tuesday evening, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of M. D. Powell. The recordership was the only business brought up. There were two candidates, Dick Breese and Earl McLaughlin and the two were voted upon by ballot. All six of the councilmen were present and the ballot resulted in a tie, each candidate receiving three votes. Then Mayor Stewart used his prerogative of casting a deciding vote, which he did in favor of McLaughlin.  
Prineville has had four city recorders this year. C. L. Shattuck was elected last December, but after a few months service resigned. M. H. Bell was chosen by the council, and died while holding office. Then Mr. Powell was reelected into service and he also resigned. Mr. McLaughlin will serve the unexpired term, or until the man elected at the regular city election to be held December 20th qualifies. Even with all this force Mayor Stewart was at one time compelled to act in the capacity of recorder during the year.
