County's Finances Are in Good Shape

Judge Ellis thus summarizes briefly the financial condition of Crook county:

The county road fund, general school fund, county high school fund and library fund each have small balances on hand.

The general county fund is in good condition considering the fact that the new county courthouse is entirely paid for.

However, the general running expenses of the county and the fall payment of the state tax (about \$8000) have necessitated registering warrants to the amount of about \$13,000. Scarp bounty warrants to the amount of about \$900 have also been registered.

The payment for the furniture and vault fixtures amounting to about \$4000 comes due in 1910.

Crook County's proportion of the state tax this year is \$17,454.34. The following summary shows the amount that must be raised for the general fund:

It is assumed that taxes will be actually collected on about \$7,400,000 and at 9 mills this will amount to \$66,600 thus leaving about \$30,945.00 for salaries, supplies, paupers, expenses of elections, two terms of the circuit court, current expenses, etc.

In re confining Prineville city prisoners in county jail. It is ordered that hereafter the city of Prineville be charged for the use of the county jail for its prisoners at the following rates: \$1 for each inmate for 12 hours or less; \$1.50 per day or for upwards of 12 hours, and at the rate of \$1 per day for all imprisonments of ten days or over. City officers to report to sheriff or jailer before confining or removing prisoners. All doors to the basement of court house to be kept closed and locked.

In the matter of using the county courthouse. It is hereby directed that no primaries, elections, meetings, conventions, sessions of justice or recorder's court be held in the courthouse or any room thereof without permission of the county commissioners' court or a majority thereof, except in criminal cases wherein the district attorney or his deputy appears and the people of the state of Oregon are plaintiffs; said building may be used by permission of the sheriff.

The county clerk is requested to advertise for bids for furnishing 100 cords of

good solid Juniper cordwood to be delivered and piled for measurement as follows: 100 cords at the rear of the courthouse building and 50 cords on the high school lot, entire amount to be delivered on or prior to September 1, 1910; court reserves right to reject any or all bids. Bids must be filed with the county clerk on or prior to 6 o'clock p. m. March 1, 1910.

In re publishing extracts of code. The sheriff is hereby directed to publish in the local newspapers, for the information of the public, so much and such part of the tax law now in force as he may deem necessary or advisable.

In the matter of assessing untaxed property. Inasmuch as the current year will be burdened with the extraordinary expense of two general elections, and inasmuch as the tax roll of this county for the year 1909 is not greatly in excess of that for 1908, and the county court is desirous of maintaining a tax levy as low as possible, and in order to do so it is necessary that all real and personal property in this county should bear its equal and just proportion of the public expense, and it appearing to the court that there is a large amount of real and personal property in this county properly subject to assessment and taxation that has not been assessed and listed upon the tax roll for 1909, and it further appearing that the assessor, through lack of time, clerical assistants or otherwise, has been unable to assess and list such property, and that the county board of equalization has failed to correct said roll and assess and list said property upon the assessment roll for the year 1909, and that all taxable property in this county should be assessed and taxed just and equal; that no remedy now exists but for the sheriff and clerk of this county to make such list and assessment. It is therefore ordered by the court that the sheriff and clerk of this county be, and they are hereby authorized and directed to take such assistance as may be necessary and examine the records of this county and assess and list for a sheriff's assessment on the 1909 tax roll, all real and personal property in this county properly subject to assessment and taxation therein that they may find and that does not appear to have been assessed for said year.

H. Grimes and J. W. Elliott are hereby appointed road viewers for year 1910. Clerk is directed to notify them of appointment.

County School Superintendent Ford has selected the following dates upon which eighth grade final examinations will be held in Crook County: January 20 and 21, 1910; May 12 and 13, 1910, and September 8 and 9, 1910.

The program for the two days will be:

Thursdays—Physiology, Writing, History and Civil Government.
Fridays—Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography and Spelling.
Sources of questions:
Arithmetic—Practical Arithmetic—Smith.
Civil Government—United States Constitution.
Geography—State Course of Study; Redway and Hlman's Natural School Geography.
History—List of topics from History Outline in State Course of Study and Current Events.
Grammar—Buehler's Modern English Grammar, no diagramming.
Physiology—Graded Lessons in Physiology and Hygiene—Krohn.
Reading—The teacher will send to the County Superintendent the applicant's class standing in reading, which shall be taken by such superintendent as the applicant's standing on the subject.

Spelling—Reed's Word Lessons.
Writing—Specimens of penmanship as indicated in copied matter and from manuscript in Language.
