The right of way differences between Hill and Harriman for possession of Central Oregon have been settled.

This adjustment has been accomplished, not as some feared it would be by the withdrawal of one railroad from the field, but in such shape that both roads will now be free to rush construction to the interior of the state. The two railroads will be built and the prospects are bright that both will be in operation to Central Oregon during the coming summer, says the Oregonian.

Under the terms of the agreement the crossing of the O. R. & N. tracks at Cellilo by the Oregon Trunk is arranged amicably, locations in the upper and lower canyon have been agreed upon, the conflict at Crooked river crossing adjusted and all right-of-way conflicts south of Madras swept away.
