C. Sam Smith Is Granted a New Trial

C. Sam Smith has been granted a new trial by the Supreme Court in a decision written by Justice Moore last Tuesday. The case was argued before the court on January 11. No information is obtainable regarding future proceedings, as to whether a change of venue will be asked. The Oregonian's Salem dispatch states that Mr. Smith is now serving a term in the penitentiary. This is an error, as he has not served any sentence at all, being at present under bonds. C. Sam Smith was convicted of the burning of J. N. Williamson's sheep shearing plant on a charge of arson in the circuit court of Crook county in 1908. If the case follows the regular order the new trial will be held at the May term of the circuit court.

New Banks for Crook County

Crook county is to be well looked after in a financial way. The latest addition to our banking facilities is the Dechutes Banking & Trust Co., of Bond. County Clerk Brown is now transcribing the articles of incorporation onto the county records. The capital stock of the bank is placed at \$15,000, divided into 100 shares of the par value of \$150 each. L. B. Baird, M. F. Coe and Frank O. Minor are the incorporators.

Redmond, too, is to be provided with an additional bank. The name of the new institution is the Redmond Bank of Commerce. Its articles of incorporation state that it will do a general savings and commercial banking and trust business. The capital stock is \$10,000, divided into 100 shares of the par value of \$100. G. E. Dodson, Harold M. Sawyer and G. C. Slocum are the incorporators.
