Looking Up Lapsed School District

Superintendent Ford returned the first of the week from a hard trip to the northeastern part of the county. School District No. 15, which is located in that inaccessible portion of Crook county, has been somewhat neglected for a number of years, and as a consequence was allowed to lapse. Mr. Ford concluded to visit the section and find out the trouble. He found several townships that were without school facilities. The children, some fifteen or twenty of them, were going to school over in Wheeler county. Usually where a school district is divided between two counties the children are enumerated in the county where they live, but in this case they were not. Wheeler county got all the benefit of the enumeration, which makes quite an item in the per capita tax. The county superintendent took the matter up with the school officials on the Wheeler side of the line and hopes to have the matter straightened out in time to get the benefit of the next school apportionment. In all probability the district will be reorganized, as most of the territory lies in Crook county.

Opal Prairie Townsite.

Culver, Ore., March 13. Ed. Journal—Deputy County Surveyor Phil Armstrong, assisted by Perry Smith and Jess Tethrow, have commenced platting the townsite of Opal Prairie, four miles west of Culver, and about two and one half miles north of Juniper Butte. The townsite is the property of J. C. Cockerham and W. C. Barber, and is what is known as the S rift place. This is an ideal location for a town as it is in the heart of the best agricultural section in the county and is on the line of both the Oregon Trunk and Harriman roads. The platting will be finished about the 17th and the plats filed for approval at the May term of the county court.

Ordinance No. 172.

An Ordinance to tax dogs and to provide for the running at large during heat, and to repeal Ordinance No. 168. The people of the City of Prineville, Oregon, do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. Every person, company or corporation owning or keeping a dog within the corporate limits of the City of Prineville, Oregon, shall pay an annual tax to the City of Prineville, on such dog as follows: For each male dog over three months old, the sum of two dollars; for each female dog the sum of four dollars; the said tax to be collectible at any time the said dog or bitch may be found within the city limits of the City of Prineville, and for which no tax on said dog has been paid for the current year, the payment of said tax of two dollars and four dollars to be in full on the dog so taxed, until the 31st day of December of the year in which the tax is paid and no other taxes, such as license or otherwise, shall be levied on such dog. The marshal of the City of Prineville, Oregon, whether he shall call for the same or not, who shall issue to the person paying such tax a receipt therefor, showing the amount paid, and for what year, together with a brief description of the dog upon which the tax is paid, giving name, age, color and sex of dog. The marshal shall also deliver to the person paying such tax a tag upon which shall be written or printed the date to which such tax is paid. Any person or persons refusing to pay said tax, and upon conviction before the recorder's court, shall pay a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10 and in default of the payment of such fine, such persons shall be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of fine. SECTION 2. Any person placing a tag as above described upon any dog upon which the tax has not been paid, shall, upon conviction thereon before the recorder's court be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the court, and in default of the payment of such fine and the costs of prosecution, such person may, by order of such court, be confined in the city jail one day for each two dollars of such fine. SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the marshal of the City of Prineville, Oregon, to take up and keep all dogs found within the corporate limits of the City of Prineville, and upon which the tax has not been paid, and if, at the expiration of five days, no person shall appear and claim such dog and pay the tax thereon and an additional sum of five dollars in costs for taking and keeping such dog, the said marshal shall dispose of such dog. SECTION 4. If any dog shall be found within the corporate limits of the City of Prineville, Oregon, without a tag as above provided, worn in a conspicuous place upon said dog, for five successive days and which the marshal of said city is unable to take up, such marshal shall kill or otherwise dispose of such dog. SECTION 5. The marshal of the city of Prineville, Oregon, shall receive for each dog taken up the sum of one dollar. If such dog is claimed before being killed or disposed of, such sum shall be paid by the person claiming such dog, or if such dog is killed by the marshal, such sum shall be paid out of the dog tax fund, and no otherwise. SECTION 6. All dogs taken up by the marshal under the provisions of this ordinance shall be kept in a remote place provided for that purpose, and where they shall not become a nuisance to the residents of the city, and shall be by said marshal, provided with sufficient food and water, until being disposed of. The word "dog" in the foregoing sections shall be construed to include all dogs, male and female, where the female dog or bitch is not mentioned. SECTION 7. It shall be unlawful for the owner or lawful possessor of any female dog or bitch to allow such animal to be at large during the period of heat or running season of such animal; and any person being the owner or lawful possessor of any such animal, allowing or permitting such animal to be at large during the period of heat or running season shall, upon conviction thereof before the recorder's court of said city, be fined not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, in the discretion of said court, and the costs of prosecution; and in default of the payment of such fine such person shall be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each two dollars of such fine. And the marshal is hereby authorized to take up and keep such animal during such period of heat, whether the tax on such animal has been paid or not. SECTION 8. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed. Inasmuch as the City of Prineville, Oregon, has no effective ordinance to provide for the taxing of dogs, and inasmuch as it is necessary to the peace, health and safety of the citizens of said city that such an ordinance should exist, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage by the council.
