Census Takers' Alloted Districts

The following are the names of the census enumerators for Crook county, their census districts and the civil sub-divisions comprising each district:

District No. 46—Ashwood precinct, including Ashwood, Henry C. Henkle census taker.

District No. 47—Bear Creek, Camp Creek and Hardin precincts, Thomas N. Balfour.

District No. 48—Beaver Creek, Maury and Summit precincts, William Johnson.

District No. 49—Bend precinct co-extensive with Bend city, Deschutes precinct, including Deschutes and Lytle towns, and Ireland precincts, including Rosland, Ernest A. Smith.

District No. 50—Black Butte precinct and Laidlaw precinct, including Laidlaw town, John T. Disney.

District No. 51—Breeze precinct and Johnson Creek precinct, and Newsum Creek precinct, Alvah E. Gilliam.

District No. 52—Cross Keys precinct and Hay Creek precinct, and Lyle Gap precinct, Merton T. Mortimore.

District No. 53—Katcher precinct, including Palmam town, Chas. M. Disney.

District No. 54—Hay Stack precinct, including Perryville town, Lamonta precinct, including Lamonta town and Willow Creek precinct, Rufus E. Waldorf.

District No. 55—Howard precinct and Mill Creek precinct, John F. Cadie.

District No. 56—McKay precinct and Montgomery precinct, and Prineville precinct co-extensive with Prineville city, Perez B. Howard.

District No. 57—Powell Butte precinct and Redmond precinct, including Clive Falls town, David W. Barnett.

District No. 58—Warm Spring precinct, Ben Morgan.

Census Points.
The census begins April 15 and must be complete in two weeks in cities and in thirty days in all other areas.

The enumerator will wear a badge inscribed "United States Census, 1910."

The law requires every adult person

to furnish the prescribed information, but also provides that it be treated confidentially, so that no injury can come to any person from answering the questions.

The President has issued a proclamation, calling on all citizens to cooperate with the census and assuring them that it has nothing to do with taxation, army, or jury service, compulsory school attendance, regulation of immigration, or enforcement of any law, and that no one can be injured by answering the inquiries.

It is of the utmost importance that the census of population and agriculture in this state be complete and correct.

Therefore every person should promptly, accurately, and completely answer the census questions asked by the enumerators.

Information Wanted.

Bishop R. L. Paddock, Episcopal bishop for Eastern Oregon, has written to a member of his flock asking for the following questions:

1. The full names of all persons (children and adults) not baptized, who are in any way interested in the Episcopal church in or near Prineville.

2. The full name of every communicant and, if possible, where, when and by what bishop confirmed.

3. Full names of all persons baptized (and not confirmed) in any way interested or connected with the church.

Bishop Paddock is anxious to establish an Episcopal mission in this rapidly developing community and asks for the cooperation of all who are interested.

A post card answering any of the above questions, and addressed to Mrs. F. J. Lively, Prineville, will be greatly appreciated, and forwarded to Bishop Paddock at Baker City, Oregon, at once.
